FROM THE K-6 PRINCIPAL

We have entered the home stretch of the year. In the next two weeks the students in grades 4 – 10 are taking the Math MCAS and the fifth and eighth grade students are taking the Science MCAS. In early June most of the ninth graders will be taking the Biology MCAS. This may be the last year that SSCPS students, other than tenth graders, take a Math or ELA MCAS. Science MCAS will continue but the Department of Elementary and Secondary Education (DESE) has given schools the opportunity to try out the PARCC (Partnership for Assessment of Readiness for College and Career) on a large scale next year. We don't yet have enough information to decide whether it is best for us to take the MCAS for another year or to switch to the PARCC. The DESE says they will adopt the PARCC if the tests are as good as or better than the MCAS. As far as is publicly know the DESE is not setting up any method to fairly test the "consequential validity" (a term from Samuel Messick of ETS, College Board http://www.nytimes.com/1998/10/19/us/samuel-messick-67-leader-ineducational-testing-field.html) of the two tests. That would take years and require a third test such as the NAEP (National Assessment of Educational Progress) to measure the effects of the testing systems to see which one produced a better effect on student learning. Because the DESE does not appear to be doing that it seems very likely that the change will be made to begin using the PARCC in the spring of 2016.

While all of these questions can seem very important to us here in school they really are not. In this space Angie has written powerfully how we view the MCAS and how the training to take the MCAS prepares our students to do useful tasks that we should do anyway. Also in these updates Alicia has written eloquently about how we do not limit our sights to doing well on the MCAS and that we have larger goals. Yes we care how our students test but we care much more about other things like hard work and learning about the world and happy children. We have used the MCAS as a tool to help us be better – we will do the same thing with the PARCC. What is more important than what test we use is how we use those tests. I believe that we have used the MCAS to make us better and I believe we will do the same with the PARCC or whatever instrument we are mandated to use. So as we prepare for what could be our last large scale giving of the MCAS I encourage all the students to work hard and to show just how much they have learned.

To me this is not the big event that is going on in school over the first three weeks of May. To me the big event is meeting the new Kindergarteners. For the past four years we have taken time in late spring to meet next year's K's and to plan for their education. This year eleven of us are involved. It takes that many folks, who all have specialization skills, to do this well. We also have the experience of the past four years and last Monday we were a well-oiled machine with each of us having different jobs. I think that my job must be the most fun. My role in this is to lead the Pre K's down the hall. I have found it works best to pretend to be a train and not to look around and just assume that they will follow; so far they have come. I have been told that the whole scene looks pretty funny but I have never seen it so I don't know. Once all of the children are gathered around the rug in the Spanish Room and the adults are standing at the other end of the room we all introduce ourselves and then I read them or more accurately sing them a book. After that some children leave to work with adults and I remain and play with the rest of the students for about an hour. The Kindergarten Screening days are certainly one reason that I love my job and why I love our school and the people who work here. I love it because we have learned how to put the right values at the heart of children's lives. It is rarely so clear when we have done something right but it is certainly worth celebrating.

The last event I want to highlight this week is the finding of worms in the garden. Because we put seaweed on our garden beds in the fall, spring worms are plentiful and easy to find. In the fall the children from Amy's Pod go to the beach and collect seaweed and then other children spread it onto the garden beds. The seaweed mulch protects the soil and prevents winter erosion but it also adds nutrients to the soil. The best way for those nutrients to get into the soil is through worms. The worms come up from the soil and live in the margin between the soil and the seaweed and through their travels and digestion they leave the soil richer in organic matter and better aerated. In the spring in my garden at home I often go looking for worms but that pleasure is nothing compared to doing it with children. Their excitement and amazement in finding worms is infectious. I can't recommend it

enough. It would be reason enough to put seaweed on your garden in the fall; the increase in your yield of vegetables is just icing on the cake.

Our goal at SSCPS is to figuratively make healthy soil. With healthy soil there are fewer insect infestations, fewer plant diseases and more crops. Those bad things still happen in a garden but they happen less often. How we respond to external events like the standardized test our students take or the requirements of the DESE, or the violence our children are exposed to are all analogous to the difficulties of a garden. If the culture and the climate of the school are healthy, by working hard on such things as having children discover worms and teams assembling to induct kindergarteners, we will be a school of healthy soil and we will be more resilient to the troubles of the world.
