FROM THE 7-12 PRINCIPAL

Take one look at the packed school calendar and you will see that the remainder of the school year is a frenzy of activity. Teachers are focused on teaching the final units of the curriculum, Projects and Workshops have planned culminating events, and each Level has community activities and field trips coming up. During these final weeks of learning, it is important to take the time to reflect, with the aim of improving, and to celebrate the many accomplishments of our students this school year. We have a great deal to celebrate!

Our lives, the lives of students, parents, and faculty, are incredibly busy. We all get caught up in everything that needs to get done each day. It is easy to fixate on the difficulties that children have as they develop as students and make their way through school, and to lose sight of the progress. DRESS CODE UPDATE

The warm weather brings with it tulips, daffodils, butterflies, and many questions about our dress code. Below please find an excerpt from the Student Handbook regarding the current dress code.

DRESS CODE

The South Shore Charter Public School is a learning environment and students are expected to take pride in their appearance and to come dressed in an appropriate manner prepared to learn. As such, parents are expected to monitor the attire of their children. The Administration reserves the right to determine what may be considered appropriate clothing.

All students, faculty, staff and visitors must abide by the following dress code or may be asked to leave the school premises or be subject to the school's disciplinary code.

- No profanity, offensive language or symbols, offensive or insinuating imagery, drug, alcohol, or tobacco language or symbols may be displayed on clothing, backpacks, etc.
- Shorts or skirts must be no more than three inches above the knees.
- The straps of tank tops, shirts, etc. must be at least one inch in width.
- Midriff and stomach area must remain covered at all times.
- Clothing must be clean and in good repair.
- All clothing must be worn in an appropriate manner as judged by faculty.
- No display of undergarments.
- No flip-flops may be worn on Level I.
- Athletic footwear is required for Physical Education classes.
- Dress code for field trips, afterschool and extracurricular activities is the school dress code or can be modified at the discretion of the Administration in consultation with the activity advisor.

This afternoon Alicia will be meeting with some of our young women from Level III to address the dress code and propose amendments. As a school, we welcome discussion of school policy and we are greatly encouraged by students who use the proper channels to propose change. It is great to see so many young women stepping forward so eloquently. Please stay tuned to the Weekly Update for information on any changes to our dress code.

ATHLETIC NEWS

Middle School Track

The Middle School Boys and Girls Track Team had their first meet of the season on Friday, May 2, 2014 at Madison Park High School in Roxbury, MA at 5:30 PM. The girls scored 37 points and finished fourth out of eight teams. The boys scored 39 points and tied for third out of eight teams. Top performers were: Sten Tchouanguem who took first place in the shot put with a throw of 34'3¾, and Drew Lussier who took first in the long jump with a jump of 15'1. The second meet of the season was cancelled due to inclement weather on Friday, May 9, 2014.

High School Track

The High School Track team took off running in their first meet on Thursday. Both the girls and boys came in second as a team, as well as had many strong individual performances. For the girls, Melissa Theodore placed 2nd in the 100m and 3rd in the 200m, Abby Dalton placed 1st in the 800m and Courtney Barry finished in a close race for 4th in the 400m. The boys team also had a few top finishes with Paul Sullivan and Ian Wright both taking first place finishes in the mile and 800m, Darius Anderson placing 5th in the 100m and 4th in the 200m, and Tyler Johnston taking 2nd in the 400m. The Jaguars will race again on Wednesday at Madison Park HS in Roxbury!
