FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

As a K-12 school community, we experience springtime through eyes of many different ages. With the unofficial beginning of summer rapidly approaching, our school community is in full swing with the excitement of spring events; field days, the prom, and trips to Cape Cod, Franklin Park Zoo, George's Island, Plimoth Plantation, and New York City. For many students, this is the best time of the school year, when they can look back at all they have accomplished and what they continue to learn, with the promise of summer imminent.


Of course this also means that as parents our time becomes even more compressed. Last year we released our Annual Parent Survey in June. Fifty-seven out of three hundred and twenty-six families responded to the survey. Although the input was very valuable, as a school we failed to meet one part of one objective in our Accountability Plan, *The Annual Parent Survey will have a 25% parent response rate*. As the end of the school year is an especially busy time for parents, a low response rate, although not desired, is more than understandable.

In an effort to remedy this, last summer we decided to conduct the Annual Parent Survey in February following the first one hundred days of school. By March we had received more than double the response rate. This year from three hundred and forty-two SSCPS families, one hundred and forty families started the survey and one hundred and seventeen completed the survey. This makes the number of completed surveys thirty-four percent, it provides us with usable data for future planning, and it means that we have met that objective in our Accountability Plan. This also means that we will have significant data for our Charter School Renewal application to be submitted this summer. Thank you for taking the time to participate in this important process.

One of the ideals that the South Shore Charter Public School was founded upon is strong parent involvement and participation. We take your responses and comments very seriously and we greatly appreciate all feedback, both critical and positive. We use critical feedback to identify issues of concern and problems to solve. We use positive feedback to recognize what is working, and then to preserve what it is that is a success. We will continue to work on preserving what works well, as well as adapting to the changing needs of our students within this educational landscape.


The second part of the aforementioned objective in our Accountability Plan states, *The satisfaction rate on all surveyed categories will be 85% or higher*. Upon reviewing the responses to all fifty questions, we were particularly pleased to read that over ninety-five percent of our parent community felt that SSCPS offers a rigorous academic program in the core subjects of English Language Arts, Mathematics, Science and Social Studies. Over ninety-three percent of our parent community felt the same for Spanish and the Arts. Academic programming is not static, but instead a progression, as student needs and curricula change.

Some additional results from the survey were as follows:













DRESS CODE UPDATE

The warm weather brings with it tulips, daffodils, butterflies, and many questions about our dress code. Below please find an excerpt from the Student Handbook regarding the current dress code.

DRESS CODE

The South Shore Charter Public School is a learning environment and students are expected to take pride in their appearance and to come dressed in an appropriate manner prepared to learn. As such, parents are expected to monitor the attire of their children. The Administration reserves the right to determine what may be considered appropriate clothing.

All students, faculty, staff and visitors must abide by the following dress code or may be asked to leave the school premises or be subject to the school's disciplinary code.

- No profanity, offensive language or symbols, offensive or insinuating imagery, drug, alcohol, or tobacco language or symbols may be displayed on clothing, backpacks, etc.
- Shorts or skirts must be no more than three inches above the knees.
- The straps of tank tops, shirts, etc. must be at least one inch in width.
- Midriff and stomach area must remain covered at all times.
- Clothing must be clean and in good repair.
- All clothing must be worn in an appropriate manner as judged by faculty.
- No display of undergarments.
- No flip-flops may be worn on Level I.
- Athletic footwear is required for Physical Education classes.
- Dress code for field trips, afterschool and extracurricular activities is the school dress code or can be modified at the discretion of the Administration in consultation with the activity advisor.
