



### FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

This week will be the first full week of school for the month of February. As every family knows, six snow days in three weeks poses real disruptions in curriculum momentum and student achievement. Please know that we greatly appreciate all that our families have done to ensure that we glean the most out of the instructional time we do have. We greatly appreciate the effort that so many of our families put forth by leaving earlier in the morning to combat difficult road conditions and traffic to be here as close to 8:15 as possible. Record-breaking snow may be exciting for some, but for families and schools it creates a level of challenge that can be trying for us all.

It is important for our school community to regain momentum during this year of assessment transition. This academic year is an significant one, it is the first year the South Shore Charter Public School will not be administering the ELA or mathematics MCAS to students in grades 3 - 8. It is also the year we will continue participating with the PARCC field test. As you may remember, last year we piloted the PARCC assessment for our students in grade 3. This year we will be expanding last year's testing group of grade 3 students to students in grades 3-11. The exception to PARCC testing will be students in grade 10 who will continue to take the MCAS to be eligible for a high school diploma. The South Shore Charter Public School will begin the Performance-based Assessments (PBA) of PARCC assessments in the second week of March. The End-of-Year (EOY) Assessments will begin during the second week of May.

Educators and parents have many questions as to why the Commonwealth is considering ending the MCAS and replacing it with PARCC. As these decisions significantly impact children and learning, the consideration is an important one. Here at the South Shore Charter Public School, one of our greatest concerns regarding the MCAS is that the achievement bar is simply set too low. Our tenth grade students take the MCAS as a requirement for graduation, but once the MCAS is completed at the end of tenth grade, that student then has to perform well on the SAT or the ACT to be truly ready for college. What many families may not realize is that there is very little alignment between the MCAS and the SAT. To be clear, the MCAS is a diploma ready exam exclusively taken by students enrolled in public school systems in Massachusetts. By contrast, the SAT is a college admission exam taken by college bound students nationally.

What is even more difficult for public school students is that many students leave the tenth grade with little time to prepare for the rigor required for college admission assessments. Having spent their education in classrooms with MCAS preparatory curricula, public school students face a significant disadvantage to their private school counterparts who have been preparing for more rigorous assessments, using very different curricula throughout their educational careers. Although clearly not the original intent, after almost twenty years of MCAS assessment, many public schools have sacrificed individual student achievement for school district accountability. This places many students enrolled in public education, including high achieving students, at a considerable disadvantage that they would not be subjected to were they enrolled in tuition-based private or parochial school.

This month the Massachusetts Business Alliance for Education (MBAE) and The National Center for the Improvement of Educational Assessment, Inc. released a report, *Educating Students for Success: A Comparison of the MCAS and PARCC Assessments as Indicators of College and Career Readiness.* The impetus for the report is to clearly illuminate the chasm that exists between the current MCAS and student college and career readiness. This report provides some interesting data gleaned from the Massachusetts Department of Education, including the following table illustrating the standards level of released test items on the tenth grade MCAS for Mathematics.

According to the MBAE report, tenth grade students must earn 17 points to receive a *Needs Improvement* score, which is the minimum requirement for a high school diploma. In 2013 a tenth grade student would had to have earned 29 points to receive a score of *Proficient;* the classification used in the past as an indicator of college or career readiness. In 2014 a tenth grade student would have to have earned 28 points to receive a *Proficient*. Instead of viewing middle school curricula as the beginning of college preparedness, it is measured as the end. Without significant intervention, tenth grade students are left with a false sense of well-being as they approach Advanced Placement coursework and the SAT.

Unfortunately, this is not news for us. Our high school faculty consists of teachers who are well practiced in the interventions necessary to fill the gaps created by ongoing state mandated assessments. Many of the coursework and curriculum changes we have implemented over the past three years, adding Honors and Advanced Placement coursework and aligning curricula to more rigorous standards, were done to specifically remedy this circumstance. Although we are far from being where we need to be, our work continues resulting in an increase in student achievement on college ready indicators.

The Massachusetts Board of Education will be deciding on the statewide assessment in the Fall following two years of piloting the PARCC. Although we do not know what the ultimate decision of the Board will be, we are fairly certain that the MCAS as we once knew it will be phased out and replaced with an assessment that more appropriately measures student achievement at every grade level. As this is the second year of the PARCC pilot, this year schools and districts were given the option of administering the PARCC on paper. Last year we administered the test on-line. This year we will be doing the same throughout the building. Although there is an option to take the test on paper, ultimately, the PARCC is a computer-based test. Unlike so many of our sending districts, we now have the technology and the infrastructure to be able to administer a computer based testing environment. We are exceedingly fortunate to have the technological capacity to administer this test due to faculty commitment and significant donations from our parent community. Because of this, our students taking this test will experience a window into the future of teaching and learning whatever the ultimate outcome will be.

Dear Parent/Guardian:

Children need healthy meals to learn. South Shore Charter Public School offers healthy meals every school day. Breakfast costs \$1.75; lunch costs \$3.25. Your children may qualify for free meals or for reduced price meals. Reduced price is \$0.30 for breakfast and \$0.40 for lunch.

- 1. Do I need to fill out an application for each child? No. Complete only one Free and Reduced Price School Meals Application for all students in your household. We cannot approve an application that is not complete, so be sure to fill out all required information. Return the completed application to: Charlene Evans, Food Services Coordinator, 781-982-4202.
- 2. *Who can get free meals?* All children in households receiving benefits from MA SNAP, MA TAFDC or the Food Distribution Program on Indian Reservations, can get free meals regardless of your income. Also, your children can get free meals if your household's gross income is within the free limits on the Federal Income Eligibility Guidelines.

If you have received a NOTICE OF DIRECT CERTIFICATION for free meals, do not complete the application. But do let the school know if any children in your household are not listed on the Notice of Direct Certification letter you received.

- 3. CAN FOSTER CHILDREN GET FREE MEALS? Yes, foster children that are under the legal responsibility of a foster care agency or court, are eligible for free meals.
- 4. *Can homeless, runaway, and migrant children get free meals?* Yes, children who meet the definition of homeless, runaway, or migrant are eligible for free meals. If you believe children in your household meet these descriptions and haven't been told your children will get free meals, please call or e-mail Angie Pepin, 7-12 Principal, 781-982-4202 or apepin@sscps.org.
- 5. WHO CAN GET REDUCED PRICE MEALS? Your children can get low cost meals if your household income is within the reduced price limits on the Federal Eligibility Income Chart, shown on this application.
- 6. SHOULD I FILL OUT AN APPLICATION IF I RECEIVED A LETTER THIS SCHOOL YEAR SAYING MY CHILDREN ARE APPROVED FOR FREE MEALS? No, but please read the letter you got carefully and follow the instructions. Call the school at **781-982-4202** if you have questions.
- 7. MY CHILD'S APPLICATION WAS APPROVED LAST YEAR. DO I NEED TO FILL OUT ANOTHER ONE? Yes. Your child's application is only good for that school year and for the first few days of this school year. You must send in a new application unless the school told you that your child is eligible for the new school year.
- 8. I GET WIC. CAN MY CHILD(REN) GET FREE MEALS? Children in households participating in WIC may be eligible for free or reduced price meals. Please send in an application.
- 9. *Will the information I give be checked?* Yes and we may also ask you to send written proof.
- 10. *If I don't qualify now, may I apply later?* Yes, you may apply at any time during the school year. For example, children with a parent or guardian who becomes unemployed may become eligible for free and reduced price meals if the household income drops below the income limit.

- 11. *What if I disagree with the school's decision about my application?* You should talk to school officials. You also may ask for a hearing by calling or writing to: Alicia Savage at 781-982-4202 or email <u>asavage@sscps.org</u> or by mail to 100 Longwater Circle, Norwell, MA 02061.
- 12. *May I apply if someone in my household is not a U.S. citizen?* Yes. You or your child(ren) do not have to be U.S. citizens to qualify for free or reduced price meals.
- 13. *Who should I include as members of my household?* You must include all people living in your household, related or not (such as grandparents, other relatives, or friends) who share income and expenses. You must include yourself and all children living with you. If you live with other people who are economically independent (for example, people who you do not support, who do not share income with you or your children, and who pay a pro-rated share of expenses), do not include them.
- 14. *What if my income is not always the same?* List the amount that you normally receive. For example, if you normally make \$1000 each month, but you missed some work last month and only made \$900, put down that you made \$1000 per month. If you normally get overtime, include it, but do not include it if you only work overtime sometimes. If you have lost a job or had your hours or wages reduced, use your current income.
- 15. *We are in the military. do we include our housing allowance as income?* If you get an off-base housing allowance, it must be included as income. However, if your housing is part of the Military Housing Privatization Initiative, do not include your housing allowance as income.
- 16. My spouse is deployed to a combat zone. is her combat pay counted as income? No, if the combat pay is received in addition to her basic pay because of her deployment and it wasn't received before she was deployed, combat pay is not counted as income. Contact your school for more information.
- 17. *My family needs more help. Are there other programs we might apply for?* To find out how to apply for MA SNAP or other assistance benefits, contact your local assistance office or call the MA SNAP Hotline **1-866-950-3663**
