



FROM THE K-6 PRINCIPAL

There are many reasons I feel very fortunate to be a Principal at the South Shore Charter Public School but one of them is the cyclical nature of my job and the patterns of the school year. For me, the routine of each day with its greeting and sweeping in the morning and the calling of the names at dismissal are anchors upon which the flow of the year rests, so I have what makes me happy: a routine that is stable but full of variety. One routine of my year is writing these Updates and for the past several years I have compiled bits of the Update pieces I have written as my final Update of the year. Reflecting on the year as it passes helps me with the closing of the school year.

This has been a rewarding but challenging year for me as my youngest child went off to college (happily for her) and my mother died (peacefully and beautifully) and my colleague for twenty years Velma Begley is retiring (happily) but I have been able to count on the teachers, families and students of the South Shore Charter School to make my life full and beautiful.

September 3

Summer is the rest that is essential in the cycle of the life of a school. A good summer is like a good night's sleep; it makes the day or the year to come all that much more promising.

September 24

When I go out into the educational world ... I hear about all of the phone calls and the e-mails other principals get from disappointed families and of all the situations they are in that need fixing. That is not my experience. There is a simple reason for that and it is the combination of systems/structure of our school and the skill of our faculty. Very few situations come to me because you, the families, collectively go to teachers and you trust them. I love to be involved but typically I am not needed and most of my job is simply being present.

October 15

Literacy Night for Levels I and II is this Thursday. It is a very simple event where from 6:00 - 7:00 adults read to children. To help set the tone children are allowed to come to school in pajamas and some of the adults even wear them too. Please come.

November 5

This afternoon students from Kevin Burokas' Gardening High School Workshop and June Fontaine's Level I Gardening Project will pick the carrots. If you have ever harvested potatoes, carrots or other root crops with children you know how joyful that can be. Under the ground there is a mystery hidden by dirt. The feeling of discovery and adventure is readily apparent. What makes the experience even more wonderful is that the mystery is food. Some of the crop will be big, some will be small. Some of the carrots will be orange, others yellow and red.

November 26

I am grateful for role models. I have role models in my colleagues who are able to tell me when they believe I am wrong and who see things that I do not see. I have role models in the student who comes to tell me about the Linux system and Ubuntu he is using and whose passion is undeniable. I have a role model in my father who for five years has taken care of my mother as she has withdrawn from the world. He has always welcomed my company but never wants to impose on me to help him with my mother's care. It reminds me how to be generous.

December 27

Thanks too to those who shared their deep appreciation to our music teachers, Wardie and Theron. Some of that feedback was not just about them as dedicated teachers; some of it was about music. Here is one of the e-mails that

we received. Music is so very important to our family ... Last night was the "first concert" in the next generation of concerts in our family. I remember the wonder and excitement of going to the school cafeteria so long ago to pick up my trumpet at "Instrument Night." I saw that look in some of those students last night. Last night was so much more than just a concert. ... along with their classmates had a chance to shine...and shine they did. If there was an "unwritten" mission statement for SSCPS, I think last night captured what "it" is all about. ... – thank you.

January 14

For me, the biggest symbol of this growth over the past five years and our new institutional maturity is babies. On the door of my office I have photographs of some of our teachers' babies and children. I am proud I work in a charter school where teachers make careers and have rich lives, and so I get to look at an important symbol of that every time I open my door. We now have enough institutional gravity that our teachers and school administrators can take time to have children and then return to our school. In the first two weeks of this year we have had two babies. Angie Pepin had a baby boy, Owen, and Rachel Rich had a baby girl, Chloe. These are two of our school leaders but the work of the last ten years has paid off. While we miss them and are excited for their return from maternity leave, we are okay and the quality of our work continues.

January 28

This week we had a big snow storm. The snow was light and fluffy but the wind was fierce and how the storm landed on each of us in this small community all depended on geography. For those who were inland it was both a pleasure and an obstacle but it was not particularly scary. For those who were on the coast it was the full force of nature showing our vulnerability. I hope everyone got through the storm with their health and happiness.

February 11

I have seen students and teachers put the snow and all of the logistics of snow in a corner of their mind and they all seem to be working hard on the business of school. The kindergarteners are celebrating the 100th day of school. The Level II students are diligently taking formative assessments and I saw dozens of Exhibitions of Mastery boards coming into school today. In short the students are doing their job and so are the teachers.

March 4 Charter is Renewed

On Kawara's work points out that by the time I read this and you read this it is no longer February 27th. But one thing we can be sure of is that it feels good to be recognized for "strong vision, high standards and hard work." All three of those compliments ring true to me but the one that I value the most is hard work. Thanks to all of the members of our community, especially the teachers for years and years of hard work. Congratulations!!!

March 19

On Wednesday morning I expected to find the sad news that the skunk cabbage was not up. I pulled off of Prospect Street in Hingham next to the George Washington Forest and expected to see only snow. I parked my car and went to look to see if perhaps I was wrong. As I traipsed across the snow I saw these bare patches. In them I found skunk cabbage maybe a little bit smaller than they had been this time in March last year but just about the same. The amazing attributes of skunk cabbage were stronger than the snow. You see skunk cabbage produces its own heat and it had melted the feet of snow.

High School Track

FROM THE MASSACHUSETTS BOARD OF ELEMENTARY AND SECONDARY EDUCATION Times for Public Forums on PARCC Assessment

The Board of Elementary and Secondary Education is holding a series of public forums across the Commonwealth on the upcoming decision on whether to sunset the Massachusetts Comprehensive Assessment System (MCAS) and adopt the Partnership for the Assessment of College and Careers (PARCC). Members of the public will be invited to attend and offer their perspectives on the PARCC assessments on the following dates and times. Please note that the time for the June 10 meeting has been shifted one hour later, with each meeting still scheduled for three hours:

- Wednesday, June 10, 2015, Bridgewater State University, Rondileau Campus Center Ballroom, 5:00-8:00 p.m.
- Monday, June 22, 2015, North Shore Community College Lynn Campus, Gymnasium, 4:00-7:00 p.m. (in lieu of the special Board meeting)
- Tuesday, July 7, 2015, Springfield Technical Community College, Top of Our City Conference Center, 4:00-7:00 p.m.

Individuals who would like to speak must register when they arrive and will be given three minutes to speak within the time allotted. In addition to hearing testimony from members of the public, the forums may also include brief presentations from educators and others with particular expertise on topics such as test administration, college and career readiness, alignment with the curriculum frameworks, implications for classroom instruction, and online testing. Members of the public who are unable to testify at one of the forums are encouraged to submit written comments toboe@doe.mass.edu.

The Board of Elementary and Secondary Education is expected to make a decision this fall as to whether PARCC should replace current MCAS tests in English language arts and mathematics. The Board will be reviewing the results of last year's field tests and this year's operational tests, as well as studies conducted by other organizations. At the request of Governor Baker and Lt. Governor Polito, the Board will also inform their decision with the additional feedback provided at the forums.
