FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

This fall the Massachusetts Department of Elementary and Secondary Education (DESE) released data from the spring 2014 MCAS testing season. In October we mailed home individual student MCAS reports so that families could see how their child has done on MCAS subject area assessments. Today's Weekly Update includes information regarding the school's annual report card, including a link to access the report card below. A link to the school's report card may also be found on our website.

School report cards were developed by the DESE to answer questions about a school's overall performance. According to the DESE website, school report cards contain specific information about student enrollment, teacher qualifications, student achievement, accountability, how a school is performing relative to other schools in the state, and the progress made toward narrowing proficiency gaps for different groups of students. DESE provides an explanation of each section of the report card, allowing for interpretation of the data. Below you will find this explanation coupled with our school's performance.

Student enrollment and teacher quality: This section of the report card provides information about the students and teachers in our school as compared to the state. As the South Shore Charter Public School receives federal Title I funds, parents have the additional right to request the following information about the qualifications of your child's classroom teacher:

- Whether your child's teacher is licensed in the grade levels and subject areas they teach
- Whether your child's teacher is teaching under an emergency license waiver
- The college degree and major of your child's teacher
- Whether your child is provided services by paraprofessionals and, if so, their qualifications

The percentage of courses taught by highly qualified teachers at the South Shore Charter Public School is 99.6 percent as compared to 93.1 percent statewide. This means that the South Shore Charter Public School scores 6.5 percent higher than the state average in the area of courses taught by highly qualified teachers.

Student assessment of MCAS and other tests: This section of the report shows how our students are performing on the Massachusetts Comprehensive Assessment Systems (MCAS) as compared to other schools and districts in the state.

School accountability information: This section of the report contains three important pieces of information based on the MCAS.

- Accountability and Assistance Levels: Schools and districts are placed into one of five accountability and assistance levels (1-5), with the highest performing in Level 1 and the lowest performing in Level 5. South Shore Charter Public School has been placed into Level 2 as DESE has determined that this year we are not meeting the state's gap narrowing goals.
- School Percentiles: A school percentile between 1 and 99 is reported for most schools. This number shows the overall performance of our school relative to other schools that serve the same or similar grades. Our school percentile is 84, up from 83 last year. This means that our school is performing higher than 84 percent of the schools in the state that service the same or similar grades.
- Progress and Performance Index (PPI): The PPI is a number that indicates our school's progress toward narrowing proficiency gaps, or, in other words, helping *all* students reach proficiency and be prepared for success after high school. Massachusetts has set a goal of reducing proficiency gaps by half between the years 2011 and 2017. For a group of students to be considered to be making sufficient progress toward narrowing proficiency gaps, its cumulative PPI must be 75 or higher.

As you will see upon review of our 2014 MCAS data, in the category of *All students* the school's PPI 79 thus meeting this target. We did not meet targets for *High needs* (70), *Low income* (69), and *Students w/disabilities* (44). We did meet and exceed targets for *African American/Black students* (87) and *White students* (78).

As a school, we analyze MCAS data comprehensively. We review individual student growth data, as well as student scores on each assessment. Although we will not be administering the MCAS in grades 3-8 for English Language Arts or Mathematics this year, we recognize the need for ongoing improvement in meeting the needs of all student populations.

We began this academic year in August with William Henderson delivering the keynote speech. Mr. Henderson's address to the faculty launched the professional development focus for this year. This year the Massachusetts Charter Public School Association has asked the South Shore Charter Public School to serve as a Model School as a school that effectively meets the needs of all student populations. We have established a school-based team who will develop, implement, and monitor specific action items to increase our capacity to support all students within our school. Team members will participate in a series of professional development opportunities with thought leaders from Landmark School Outreach and Portland State University to address topics such as school-wide positive behavior supports, effective classroom practices and differentiated instruction, and effective methodologies for all students.

We will continue to do what has proven successful. Three years ago we began an extensive Response to Intervention program. Known throughout the school as Focused Instructional Time (FIT), this program began on Level III and has since expanded. We now have FIT in Levels II, III, IV, and within the high school. As our experience with FIT has been exceedingly positive and demonstrated significant academic outcomes, this year we will be exploring ways to make the positive ramifications of FIT even more far-reaching.

On their website, the DESE offers a series of recommendations for parents to become more involved in their child's education. These recommendations include encouraging your child's learning at home, attending parent teacher meetings, volunteering, and encouraging other parents to become involved. We are exceedingly fortunate to have a strong parent community at South Shore Charter Public School. We know that you are encouraging your child's learning at home by checking homework, reviewing classwork, and reading together. We know that every parent works hard to make parent-teacher conferences and goal-setting meetings throughout the year. And our school community is made more vibrant each day by the high number of volunteers we have in our classrooms and at our school-wide events. Parent involvement is a significant element of student growth and development and we greatly appreciate your continued efforts toward your child's achievement.

How Parents Can Help Their Teens' Mental Health

The mental health of teenagers is largely impacted by how well their parents understand them, according to a recent study published in Psychosomatic Medicine: Journal of Biobehavioral Medicine. Those whose parents had a better grasp of both the stressors of the teen's day and the teen's perspective on their relationship with the parent had lower levels of depression.

In this study, a group of parents and teens filled out daily diaries for two weeks. They each individually rated the daily demands on the teen, from school, home, or other external sources, and also rated the positivity of their day together – whether they got along well that day or not. The teens also rated the levels of stress or depression they experienced. Teenagers whose parents who had a good sense of the teen's perception of their relationship

reported feeling lower levels of stress and depression. So regardless of whether the relationship on that day felt positive or negative, just an understanding of how the teen was feeling made a positive difference.

The teenage mind is complicated, but this study provides confirmation of what may be one of the most important things that a parent can do to help their teen navigate a very difficult time in life. By taking the time to listen and communicate with their teen and to connect with them on a level that increases their understanding of the teen, parents play a role in their teen's mental stability. As is true of most of us, teens that feel understood, feel better.

Dear Parent/Guardian:

Children need healthy meals to learn. **South Shore Charter Public School** offers healthy meals every school day. Breakfast costs \$1.75; lunch costs \$3.25. Your children may qualify for free meals or for reduced price meals. Reduced price is \$0.30 for breakfast and \$0.40 for lunch.

- 1. Do I need to fill out an application for each child? No. Complete only one Free and Reduced Price School Meals Application for all students in your household. We cannot approve an application that is not complete, so be sure to fill out all required information. Return the completed application to: Charlene Evans, Food Services Coordinator, 781-982-4202.
- 2. Who can get free meals? All children in households receiving benefits from MA SNAP, MA TAFDC or the Food Distribution Program on Indian Reservations, can get free meals regardless of your income. Also, your children can get free meals if your household's gross income is within the free limits on the Federal Income Eligibility Guidelines.



If you have received a NOTICE OF DIRECT CERTIFICATION for free meals, do not complete the application. But do let the school know if any children in your household are not listed on the Notice of Direct Certification letter you received.

- 3. CAN FOSTER CHILDREN GET FREE MEALS? Yes, foster children that are under the legal responsibility of a foster care agency or court, are eligible for free meals.
- 4. Can homeless, runaway, and migrant children get free meals? Yes, children who meet the definition of homeless, runaway, or migrant are eligible for free meals. If you believe children in your household meet these descriptions and haven't been told your children will get free meals, please call or e-mail Angie Pepin, 7-12 Principal, 781-982-4202 or apepin@sscps.org.
- 5. WHO CAN GET REDUCED PRICE MEALS? Your children can get low cost meals if your household income is within the reduced price limits on the Federal Eligibility Income Chart, shown on this application.
- 6. SHOULD I FILL OUT AN APPLICATION IF I RECEIVED A LETTER THIS SCHOOL YEAR SAYING MY CHILDREN ARE APPROVED FOR FREE MEALS? No, but please read the letter you got carefully and follow the instructions. Call the school at **781-982-4202** if you have questions.
- 7. MY CHILD'S APPLICATION WAS APPROVED LAST YEAR. DO I NEED TO FILL OUT ANOTHER ONE? Yes. Your child's application is only good for that school year and for the first few days of this school year. You must send in a new application unless the school told you that your child is eligible for the new school year.
- 8. I GET WIC. CAN MY CHILD(REN) GET FREE MEALS? Children in households participating in WIC may be eligible for free or reduced price meals. Please send in an application.
- 9. Will the information I give be checked? Yes and we may also ask you to send written proof.
- 10. If I don't qualify now, may I apply later? Yes, you may apply at any time during the school year. For example, children with a parent or guardian who becomes unemployed may become eligible for free and reduced price meals if the household income drops below the income limit.

- 11. What if I disagree with the school's decision about my application? You should talk to school officials. You also may ask for a hearing by calling or writing to: Alicia Savage at 781-982-4202 or email asavage@sscps.org or by mail to 100 Longwater Circle, Norwell, MA 02061.
- 12. May I apply if someone in my household is not a U.S. citizen? Yes. You or your child(ren) do not have to be U.S. citizens to qualify for free or reduced price meals.
- 13. Who should I include as members of my household? You must include all people living in your household, related or not (such as grandparents, other relatives, or friends) who share income and expenses. You must include yourself and all children living with you. If you live with other people who are economically independent (for example, people who you do not support, who do not share income with you or your children, and who pay a pro-rated share of expenses), do not include them.
- 14. What if my income is not always the same? List the amount that you normally receive. For example, if you normally make \$1000 each month, but you missed some work last month and only made \$900, put down that you made \$1000 per month. If you normally get overtime, include it, but do not include it if you only work overtime sometimes. If you have lost a job or had your hours or wages reduced, use your current income.
- 15. We are in the military. do we include our housing allowance as income? If you get an off-base housing allowance, it must be included as income. However, if your housing is part of the Military Housing Privatization Initiative, do not include your housing allowance as income.
- 16. My spouse is deployed to a combat zone. is her combat pay counted as income? No, if the combat pay is received in addition to her basic pay because of her deployment and it wasn't received before she was deployed, combat pay is not counted as income. Contact your school for more information.
- 17. *My family needs more help. Are there other programs we might apply for?* To find out how to apply for MA SNAP or other assistance benefits, contact your local assistance office or call the MA SNAP Hotline **1-866-950-3663**

SHARING INFORMATION WITH MEDICAID/SCHIP

Dear Parent/Guardian:

If your children get free or reduced price school meals, they <u>may</u> also be able to get free or low-cost health insurance through Medicaid or the State Children's Health Insurance Program (SCHIP). Children with health insurance are more likely to get regular health care and are less likely to miss school because of sickness.

Because health insurance is so important to children's well-being, the law allows us to tell Medicaid and SCHIP that your children are eligible for free or reduced price meals, unless you tell us not to. Medicaid and SCHIP only use the information to identify children who may be eligible for their programs. Program officials may contact you to offer to enroll your children. Filling out the Free and Reduced Price School Meals Application does not automatically enroll your children in health insurance.
