FROM THE K-6 PRINCIPAL

There is a great deal going on here in the month of December. There are the Third Grade Roman plays, First and Second Grade poetry recitals, Craft Day and more and more. One large event that we held last week was the Winter Concert. It was our twentieth concert in December and it was great fun. Thanks to all who brought their children and shared community with us as we sang and played together.

Thanks too to those who shared their deep appreciation to our music teachers, Wardie and Theron. Some of that feedback was not just about them as dedicated teachers; some of it was about music. Here is one of the e-mails that we received.

Music is so very important to our family ... Last night was the "first concert" in the next generation of concerts in our family. I remember the wonder and excitement of going to the school cafeteria so long ago to pick up my trumpet at "Instrument Night." I saw that look in some of those students last night. Last night was so much more than just a concert. ... along with their classmates had a chance to shine ... and shine they did.

If there was an "unwritten" mission statement for SSCPS, I think last night captured what "it" is all about. ... – thank you.

Since our beginning one of the things we have said about ourselves is that we are a "Project Based School." When I describe us to the outside world I talk about how our students are strong public speakers, I explain that they are good with adults, and describe how they are able to organize themselves and others. In sum they are good "party planners."

I think one of the ways our students acquire those qualities is through years of Exhibitions of Mastery, Town Meeting, and Projects/Workshops.

On Tuesday, December 23, there is an opportunity to see two aspects of this work at its best. The Annual High School Art Workshop Exhibition of Mastery otherwise known as the "SSCPS Fashion Walk" will begin at 11:00am at the SSCPS Gym. Each of the past eight years, Marianne Buckley Curran, the High School Workshop leader, has picked a theme and the High School Art Workshop students create fashions based on that theme. This year the theme is paper. I urge all who can to come see us at our finest and see the way our students express themselves. Come see how they invent things that have never been seen before. I have included in this Update a picture of Morgan Rousseau and her creation in its early stages. Come see the finished product up close and all of the work that will be on display.



Cultural Partnerships: Frequently Asked Questions

Q: How does it work?

When you arrive at the museum, you should show your EBT card at the ticket counter and you will receive a discounted admission price.

Q: How many people can I bring with me to the museum?

The number of people that can receive discounted admission to a museum using the same EBT card varies by institution. This information can be found on our Partnerships Flyer at www.mass.gov/dta or you can always call the museum directly to ask them about their admission policies.

Q: If I am taking my child to the museum and they want to bring their friend, can I still receive the EBT-discounted admission?

Yes. You can use your EBT card for admission regardless of whether or not the people that you are bringing with you are members of your household.

Q: Can I only receive the discounted admission on a certain day of the week?


You can use your EBT card for admission any day of the week.

Q: How many times can I attend the museum with the EBT discount?

There is no limit to the number of times that you can use your EBT card, so feel free to use it often!

Q: How much will admission cost with my EBT discount?

The EBT admission prices vary by institution, but none are higher than \$3 per person. The specific prices can be found on our Partnerships Flyer at www.mass.gov/dta or you can always call the museum directly to ask them about their admission policies.

Dear Parent/Guardian:

Children need healthy meals to learn. **South Shore Charter Public School** offers healthy meals every school day. Breakfast costs \$1.75; lunch costs \$3.25. Your children may qualify for free meals or for reduced price meals. Reduced price is \$0.30 for breakfast and \$0.40 for lunch.

- 1. Do I need to fill out an application for each child? No. Complete only one Free and Reduced Price School Meals Application for all students in your household. We cannot approve an application that is not complete, so be sure to fill out all required information. Return the completed application to: Charlene Evans, Food Services Coordinator, 781-982-4202.
- 2. Who can get free meals? All children in households receiving benefits from MA SNAP, MA TAFDC or the Food Distribution Program on Indian Reservations, can get free meals regardless of your income. Also, your children can get free meals if your household's gross income is within the free limits on the Federal Income Eligibility Guidelines.



If you have received a NOTICE OF DIRECT CERTIFICATION for free meals, do not complete the application. But do let the school know if any children in your household are not listed on the Notice of Direct Certification letter you received.

- 3. CAN FOSTER CHILDREN GET FREE MEALS? Yes, foster children that are under the legal responsibility of a foster care agency or court, are eligible for free meals.
- 4. Can homeless, runaway, and migrant children get free meals? Yes, children who meet the definition of homeless, runaway, or migrant are eligible for free meals. If you believe children in your household meet these descriptions and haven't been told your children will get free meals, please call or e-mail Angie Pepin, 7-12 Principal, 781-982-4202 or apepin@sscps.org.
- 5. WHO CAN GET REDUCED PRICE MEALS? Your children can get low cost meals if your household income is within the reduced price limits on the Federal Eligibility Income Chart, shown on this application.
- 6. SHOULD I FILL OUT AN APPLICATION IF I RECEIVED A LETTER THIS SCHOOL YEAR SAYING MY CHILDREN ARE APPROVED FOR FREE MEALS? No, but please read the letter you got carefully and follow the instructions. Call the school at **781-982-4202** if you have questions.
- 7. MY CHILD'S APPLICATION WAS APPROVED LAST YEAR. DO I NEED TO FILL OUT ANOTHER ONE? Yes. Your child's application is only good for that school year and for the first few days of this school year. You must send in a new application unless the school told you that your child is eligible for the new school year.
- 8. I GET WIC. CAN MY CHILD(REN) GET FREE MEALS? Children in households participating in WIC may be eligible for free or reduced price meals. Please send in an application.
- 9. Will the information I give be checked? Yes and we may also ask you to send written proof.
- 10. If I don't qualify now, may I apply later? Yes, you may apply at any time during the school year. For example, children with a parent or guardian who becomes unemployed may become eligible for free and reduced price meals if the household income drops below the income limit.

- 11. What if I disagree with the school's decision about my application? You should talk to school officials. You also may ask for a hearing by calling or writing to: Alicia Savage at 781-982-4202 or email asavage@sscps.org or by mail to 100 Longwater Circle, Norwell, MA 02061.
- 12. May I apply if someone in my household is not a U.S. citizen? Yes. You or your child(ren) do not have to be U.S. citizens to qualify for free or reduced price meals.
- 13. Who should I include as members of my household? You must include all people living in your household, related or not (such as grandparents, other relatives, or friends) who share income and expenses. You must include yourself and all children living with you. If you live with other people who are economically independent (for example, people who you do not support, who do not share income with you or your children, and who pay a pro-rated share of expenses), do not include them.
- 14. What if my income is not always the same? List the amount that you normally receive. For example, if you normally make \$1000 each month, but you missed some work last month and only made \$900, put down that you made \$1000 per month. If you normally get overtime, include it, but do not include it if you only work overtime sometimes. If you have lost a job or had your hours or wages reduced, use your current income.
- 15. We are in the military. do we include our housing allowance as income? If you get an off-base housing allowance, it must be included as income. However, if your housing is part of the Military Housing Privatization Initiative, do not include your housing allowance as income.
- 16. My spouse is deployed to a combat zone. is her combat pay counted as income? No, if the combat pay is received in addition to her basic pay because of her deployment and it wasn't received before she was deployed, combat pay is not counted as income. Contact your school for more information.
- 17. *My family needs more help. Are there other programs we might apply for?* To find out how to apply for MA SNAP or other assistance benefits, contact your local assistance office or call the MA SNAP Hotline **1-866-950-3663**

SHARING INFORMATION WITH MEDICAID/SCHIP

Dear Parent/Guardian:

If your children get free or reduced price school meals, they <u>may</u> also be able to get free or low-cost health insurance through Medicaid or the State Children's Health Insurance Program (SCHIP). Children with health insurance are more likely to get regular health care and are less likely to miss school because of sickness.

Because health insurance is so important to children's well-being, the law allows us to tell Medicaid and SCHIP that your children are eligible for free or reduced price meals, unless you tell us not to. Medicaid and SCHIP only use the information to identify children who may be eligible for their programs. Program officials may contact you to offer to enroll your children. Filling out the Free and Reduced Price School Meals Application does not automatically enroll your children in health insurance.
