



FROM THE K-6 PRINCIPAL

One of the great things about being a part of a school is the cyclical nature of the work that goes on. There is a rhythm to the year. There are markers or recurring events that signal each stage of each year. The first day of school, the spring and winter concerts, Exhibitions of Mastery, and teacher appreciation lunch are some examples. These events are similar from year to year but each time we experience them they are new. The cycling through the school year provides a sense of novelty within the comfort of familiarity. We are now entering the final eighth of the school year. A time of closure and consolidation. The school year is coming to its end and the learning we all do is coalescing. We work hard to make it stable and permanent.

In the last week there were three events that fit that profile of old yet new and all of them happened on Friday, May 6th. At lunch, the faculty and staff were treated to an amazing meal of home cooked food. We all ate together and enjoyed the feeling of being valued and supported by a community. In all, forty different families contributed food. The teachers and staff all ate together and knew that the families of the children we worked with every day were saying thank you to us. We felt the love and the respect. Thank you to all who contributed and to Deb Paquette and her crew of volunteers who made sure we knew we were appreciated.

At 1:00 a group of us got to meet 18 students who will become part of SSCPS next August. Kindergarten screening is one of my favorite events of the year and there is a routine that I follow that is almost identical each year for kindergarten screening. What was new for me this year was that a crew of six of our current Kindergarteners helped me set up the room for the incoming K's. The six students remembered that the room looked just that way a year ago when they had first come to school. On screening days I try to wear my Sesame Street tie because it has been something that the small children notice and talk to me about. Earlier this year when I had worn the tie on a regular school day one of our K's said to me, "That is the tie you wore on the first day of school." In her mind the day of the K screening in the spring was her first day of school even though she had to wait until the end of August for her second day of school. As we set up the room, memories came flooding back to the students; how deeply they thought about their past showed me just how important Kindergarten screening is.

For the screening we all met in the lobby and we became a train. As the locomotive of this train I never look around as eye contact can be very scary to children. If I don't look they are more at ease and more likely to follow. We came into the room and sat around a rug and we introduced ourselves at the level that we were comfortable. Then I sang a story and book I had read to my own children many years ago. In past screenings I was able to sing the book from memory. But I guess now that all of my own children are in their twenties it has been too long and I had to peek at a few of the pages. The children were as good as gold. The teachers took them off and worked with them one at a time and I stayed behind to play on the floor with the others. Soon all were gone and the teachers got to talk about the students who will graduate in 2029.

With these kids I already see that there has been a small change in the society that they live in as none of the new students talked to me about my Sesame Street tie. Perhaps it was this particular group but also perhaps there has been a shift in the culture and small children are no longer watching Sesame Street. Who knows what kind of world they will graduate into but I hope in 2029 there are still adults getting down on the floor reading with children and playing with blocks. It really doesn't matter so much what the book is or exactly what kinds of blocks but it does matter that it is the floor and that the play occupies space in the non-digital world.

Only a little while later a whole lot of us enjoyed the Annual Auction. In fact 275 of us were there. Laurie Dannison and her crew created a wonderful party. Folks gathered and saw old friends and made new ones. There were families that sent their children to the school for the first time twenty-one years ago and there were other families excited to be joining our school for the first time next year. What I saw were people celebrating the school and the good works of the school.

There is an idea which came from Swedish psychologist Anders Ericsson that was popularized in North America by Malcolm Gladwell, that it takes 10,000 hours to become an expert. Well I do not know how many hours Laurie Dannison has spent planning parties but my guess is that it has to be well over 10,000 hours because she is simply an expert. Not only did everyone I talked to have a wonderful time but the auction raised more money for the school than any previous auction. You see, Laurie is extremely good at soliciting partnerships. She had the whole school making items for the auction. She had collected amazing goods and services to auction. She had even gotten her husband Charles to be the MC. He captivated the crowd with stories and humor and he encouraged folks to put their love of the school into the expenditure of cash. And she got one of our Society of Thirteen alumni to be there. For me, the best moment of the evening was when Carly Hayes sang "Somewhere Over the Rainbow." The River Club became still and the only sound was Carly's strong and deep voice expressing all of the emotion of the song. The place was silent. I have never heard a Charter School event that was silent. Perhaps you just have to be as transporting as Carly is to have that happen. Laurie does not forget the details and she made sure that Rick Small, Claire Overlee, and Dan Falkner, who will all retire this year, had the opportunity to be recognized by the community for their years of service and their role in building our school. If anyone had any doubt that they were part of something bigger than themselves, Laurie's party made sure we all knew it.





School Partnerships
