



FROM THE K-6 PRINCIPAL

Last weekend we as Americans experienced a horrible hate crime and act of terrorism in the Orlando Pulse Nightclub shooting. It was the most deadly shooting in our history and one that targeted our most frequently victimized minority group, the LGBT community. It was and is horrible. The shooting was another piece of evidence that there are bad people in this world but our message to our children and to each other should be that there are more people who are filled with love than those filled with hate. There is a poster of Martin Luther King, Jr. outside my office that quotes from the following passage:

The ultimate weakness of violence is that it is a descending spiral, begetting the very thing it seeks to destroy. Instead of diminishing evil, it multiplies it. Through violence you may murder the liar, but you cannot murder the lie, nor establish the truth. Through violence you may murder the hater, but you do not murder hate. In fact, violence merely increases hate. So it goes. Returning violence for violence multiplies violence, adding deeper darkness to a night already devoid of stars. Darkness cannot drive out darkness: only light can do that. Hate cannot drive out hate: only love can do that.

In these Updates I often write about the cycle of the school year. Our school's cycle runs independently of the individual family, national and international cycles that are concurrently spinning. But our cycle is porous and is influenced by a child's illness, a new baby, a birthday, a move, a tragedy -- all of the joys, sadness, triumphs and crises of the larger and smaller worlds. An event of the importance of the Pulse Nightclub shooting does come into our school and does have impact on our days within our small community. Our school is a part of and in that wider world. But we are also removed and separate from that larger world because our school is a world for children. Right now the routines and rituals of the end of the year have great drive and power and they protect us a bit from the current national tragedy.

Yesterday I saw an example of one of our own traditions and patterns that are connected with the end of the school year: the first and second graders' trip to Nantasket Beach in Hull. In fact this event was so powerful that I forgot about Orlando for a while. There were about 90 six, seven, and eight year olds, and assorted younger siblings and many family members and teachers at the beach. I live in Hull and I go to that beach about three or four times a week all year round. But there is nothing like taking ninety kids to the beach. All I could see or remember at that moment was love and joy. But it was not just the power of the beach and the beauty of the day, it was the power of the SSCPS school and SSCPS education. It was the power of the values the children have learned, many of them from you but also many of them from school. On the way to the beach the children sang these songs:

"This Land is Your Land" "America the Beautiful" "Peace Like a River" "My Country 'tis of Thee" "Bingo" It was very therapeutic for me to hear those songs and to think that that was what the children wanted to sing. It was not a political act on their part to praise our country or to sing old songs it was just a way to have fun. But it felt political to me. It seemed to be following Martin Luther King's message that only light can drive out darkness and only love can drive out hate. It reminded me that the larger arc of history is changing in good ways as well as in bad.

At the June concert I don't know how many of you could discern the words these children sang when they sang "When the Saints Go Marching In". The first and second graders sang new words that had been written by the students in Sheina's Pod. These are the words they sang,

"When the Saints go marching in Oh when the Saints go marching in We are going to be the color of the rainbow When the Saints go marching in"

Now I am nearly certain that they did not mean any direct reference to the LGBT community when they made up those words. I believe that what our children meant when they wrote and sang those words was that they were going to embrace everything and be open. So as we face a truly horrific and terrible event, remember that there are lots of good folks around and many things are better now than they were when we were children.

One example of a new good thing in this world is the South Shore Charter Public School.

At this time of year I typically recap the year with portions from each of our months but this year I thought it was more important to write about the beach and the shooting. The recapping of the year will have to wait for another year.

May you all have a summer of joy and may you all find a chance to do something that gives you as much happiness as taking 90 first and second graders to the beach gives me.
