## From the K-4 Principal

One of the lessons we teach children in Open Circle, the social and emotional learning program for elementary schools that we use K-4, is how to receive a compliment. The lesson is in Open Circle because the ability to generously receive a compliment is not something all children know how to do. It helps both the giver and the receiver when a compliment is accepted. This past week I received two compliments I want to share with you. They both made me pleased and satisfied. These compliments were not about me and only tangentially and marginally related to my work here. One of the compliments was said directly to me by a parent at a Title I family meeting and the second was written to the entire school staff by Matt Tondorf, our Learning Service Director.

In the Title I meeting the mother of a child who is in Title I asked me how I felt the year was going and what was the impact of the expansion. I told her I thought it was going very well. We talked for a while about what was involved and what had been done. We talked about the logistics, the planning, the architect, and all of the work that had been done to make us a bigger school. She said she thought that it was remarkable that we had done all this in such a short time and that it did feel that the year was off to an excellent start. Her feedback made me stop and think. Yes what has been done this year really is remarkable. We acquired a whole new space and it has proved functional and it has proved to be us. New teachers are here and they are adding value and making us better. Our per-pupil tuition dollars this year are about two percent less than last year's and historically we are used to a three percent increase. The mother and I agreed that those two factors together were like a five percent cut and yet I don't feel the constraint of having cut opportunities here at SSCPS. It feels like we have more and better space and staff than ever before. There is only one thing that could make that happen and that is teamwork and effective management. It felt good to stop and reflect and quietly celebrate about what we had done.

One of our former parents, Katherine Kardok, is a swim coach. Because Katherine knew I swam she often invited me to go to clinics where she would bring in swim coaches. She brought in folks such as Rowdy Gaines, the swimming commentator for the Olympics. Another person she had in to run a clinic was a paraplegic swimmer named Dave Denniston. In this clinic on how to do the breaststroke Dave gave us instructions on how to do the modern breaststroke, which I vaguely recalled, but there was a piece of advice he gave to us all that I use frequently. He told us that when things go well, even if it is not the ultimate goal, or what we think we are striving for, it is good to stop and quietly celebrate and take the time to appreciate where you are. The conversation with the mother in the Title I meeting about the year and our expansion made me reflect on what had happened in the past eight months. What we have done in this time is an accomplishment and it is the product of the work of the new teachers, the new students, the new families and to all of us who have been here before -- it is good to give ourselves recognition for this collective work..

The second compliment came in the form of an e-mail that Matt wrote to us with his impressions of the exit interview he had with the people from the state department of education who were conducting our Coordinated Program Review. Once every six years the DESE inspects every school district in the state to review their special education, civil rights and English Language Learner services. The two people from the state who came to visit us last week were knowledgeable and sophisticated and they were here to review our work. They were here to help us become better. They talked to teachers, administrators and family members, they reviewed records and they looked around to see how we were doing.

Here is how Matt summarized the impressions the team generated in their review of our school:

- The team was amazed that on the heels of an extremely large expansion how unbelievable the moral of the entire staff is. Everyone is happy, enjoys working here and is supportive of the incredible growth that has taken place.
- The overwhelming theme from both interviewers was the staff's commitment to "educate all students in the inclusive environment", they said that although people identified inclusion as a challenge, each and everyone was committed and passionate about making it work.
- They mentioned how committed everyone was to the school's vision.
- They said that in many schools each department/program is very compartmentalized; they saw each department/program at SSCPS working in as united front for the benefit of each child. They were blown away that when asked the question "What is the best/most awesome thing about SSCPS?" Just about every person interviewed, including the parents, said, "How well the whole staff works towards supporting each and every child."
- They were impressed with the longevity of our staff; they said that is not typical in charter schools. During several interviews teachers reported that they intended to work at SSCPS for 1 year to get their feet wet in education but after their first year loved it so much they never left.

Now that is a compliment and as it is a compliment to the whole the community I wanted to share it with you all.
Tonight is Literacy Night and one important parts of the Coordinated Program Review is an analysis of how our programs for work for students and families whose first language is not English. One thing the reviewers look for is an inclusive environment. One very exciting thing about this year's Literacy Night is that we will have readers reading seven languages: Haitian Creole, French, Spanish, Slovenian, Tagalog, Korean, and English. Please come with your K - 4 children and wear your pajamas. I guarantee it will be fun.
