A Message from Alicia

Returning from April break looks different this year. Usually the weeks from April to June are full of excitement and promise. Field trips, color games, and award ceremonies are end of the year traditions that students happily anticipate. Yet this year looks different. Throughout Massachusetts students continue to stay home, giving up their world temporarily for the greater good of the world at large. The incredible sacrifices our students have made must be recognized.

As parents you not only have a front row seat to these sacrifices, you have made sacrifices as well. Many of you are working from home trying to juggle your child's distance learning. Some of our families have one or two parents working in healthcare on the front lines. Many of you are essential workers unable to supervise your child's learning until you come home exhausted from a long day. Other families are struggling with the economic ramifications of business closures and job loss.

As a collective whole, we understand the importance of staying at home; this is a pandemic and lives are at stake. Health is the first priority, but it is not the only priority. Your child's education remains a priority in all circumstances, even during a pandemic.

The Massachusetts Department of Education released updated guidance on remote learning for school districts and charter schools Friday night following Governor Baker's announcement on school building closure for the remainder of the academic year. The Department of Education has divided the learning period into four phases. Phase I, the first week of building closure, was described as a time when the state focus was on "student and staff safety, nutrition, and other foundational needs." At the South Shore Charter Public School, we took Phase I one step further by beginning our remote learning model on Monday, March 16, 2020.

The Department of Education released initial guidance on remote learning on March 26, 2020. This is described as Phase II. By the time we received Phase II guidelines from the state, our school was well into our second week of remote learning. Not all districts and charter schools began Phase II at the same time. A few schools and districts began on March 16, however most districts began onboarding distance learning programs later in April.

Friday's message provided new information regarding the phase we are entering now; Phase III. Phase III includes, "Further defining the recommended elements of a quality remote learning program, including a focus on teaching the content standards most critical for success on the next grade level." We have now entered the period of time where we are focused on solidifying the learning standards that we have been working on throughout the school year, both before and after March 13, so that we can anticipate where the each student will be when we reconvene in the fall.

Phase IV is identified as the final phase in which we are permitted to return to our buildings for the next school year. Before we look to Phase IV, it is critical for our school to continue to build and refine the remote learning program we began implementing on March 16. Although remote learning has its challenges, it is the hand we have been dealt and we will make the best of it.

Dear Charter Public School Supporters,

Over the weekend, <u>Commonwealth Magazine published an opinion piece</u> that I coauthored with Tom Scott, Executive Director of the Massachusetts Association of School Superintendents. Collectively, our respective associations represent almost all of Massachusetts's public schools.

The economic impact of COVID-19 in Massachusetts could result in a <u>\$4 billion to \$6</u> <u>billion revenue shortfall</u> for the state budget. This could jeopardize planned spending designed to address decades-long inequities in state education funding, and will also create further financial stress on schools at a time when the "<u>COVID-19</u> <u>Slide</u>" will likely worsen these inequities. We cannot allow the virus to hurt our children's education and their future.

In the coming weeks, the federal government will consider a further stimulus package to respond to this public health crisis. I respectfully ask you to join us in supporting the National Governors Association's call for <u>\$500 billion</u> to help offset state revenue shortfalls, as well as the National School Superintendents Association and other education groups request for <u>\$200 billion</u> for public schools.

Once again, we ask that you please support our Commonwealth's kids by taking a quick and easy action today!

Pick-up Procedures



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
