Today our nation recognizes Patriot Day and all those who were lost on September 11, 2001. It is an important day for our nation and our school community. The flags outside our building are flying at half-staff and there are remembrances on television, radio, and the internet. This morning our school observed a moment of silence at 8:46, the moment American Airlines Flight 11 flew into the North Tower of the World Trade Center. 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We take a moment on this day to remember and appreciate our local military, veterans, first responders, and local unsung heroes. We hope you honor them with an act of kindness or act of service as a sign of unity, appreciation, and a remembrance of the strength we have as a united community and country.

Each year our school marks the events of September 11 with ageappropriate lessons and classroom discussions. Students in Jody Regan's middle school math class watch <u>Boatlift</u> and discuss bravery and resiliency. High school students in United States Government classes read <u>The Red Bandanna</u> to explore individual sacrifice and what it means to serve others. Last year I was particularly moved by history teacher Margaret Bulger's words to our high school students, most of whom were born after 2001.

With the passage of time it is easy to forget that September 11, 2001 was the bloodiest day in U.S. history since the Civil War. This week we talked about the balance between order and freedom. Let us remember those who died by remembering that freedom is still the cornerstone of our democracy and that we must preserve it in their memory.

As the adults in our children's lives, parents and teachers have become the means by which students learn about September 11. We remember the tragic events of the day clearly. We can recall where we were, who we were with, the beautiful weather that morning, and how we felt when we learned of loved ones lost. Although this is a role we may not have anticipated, parents and teachers have become the oral historians for our children and their generation. It has become our job now to honor the memory of all that was lost and to share those stories with the children in our lives. Thank you for being an essential participant in this remembrance.

Charter Renewal Update

Last week we welcomed a site team visit from the Massachusetts Department of Elementary and Secondary Education. This year marks our 25th anniversary and it is also a charter renewal year. The charter renewal process occurs once every five years. The purpose of the renewal cycle is to ensure that our school is effective and viable, and that we are staying true to our mission of inspiring every student to succeed in academics, service, and life.

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September 5, 2019, the seventh day of the new school year. The visiting team was comprised of four educators from School Works, the organization contracted by the state to conduct site visits. The team arrived at 6:45 in the morning and left at 6:30 in the evening. Throughout the day members of the team observed classrooms and met with focus groups. These focus groups were categorized into Board of Trustees, Administration, Special Education Administration, Special Education Faculty, High School Faculty and K-8 Faculty. It was a full day for all. Thank you all who participated in the focus groups and a special thanks to all faculty and staff who prepared so well for that day.

The next step for the visiting team will be to finish the Renewal Inspection Evidence (REI) report based on data gleaned from the site visit and the documentation we provided over the summer. Once the Department of Education receives the REI, they will prepare a Summary of Review. The school will receive a preliminary draft of the Summary of Review so that we may make any factual corrections to the report. When able to do so, the results will be shared with the school community.

Thank you all members of the school community who have helped along the way; students, faculty, staff, families, and members of the Board of Trustees.

Pickup Procedures

All of us share the common interest at dismissal time of getting all students safely and efficiently into their correct vehicles. Our first goal is safety. The second is an efficient system that treats everyone equitably. Following these procedures will help us maintain a positive school culture and neighborly relations with the other tenants of Assinippi Park. Please remember the following:

- The campus is closed to pick-up traffic before 3:00 pm at both locations
- Students in K-8 must be picked up at 100 Longwater Circle
- Students in grades 9-12 should be picked up at 700 Longwater Drive
- Students may be picked up at the front or back doors only. Other pick up points put student safety at risk. Pick up in other lots is trespassing
- If you do not want to wait in line, you may find that planning to arrive between 3:15 and 3:25 pm works better for your family
- When an appointment requires an exact 3:00 pm dismissal, we ask that you pick up your student at or before 2:30
- There is no cell phone use while driving on campus during arrival and dismissal

- The speed limit on campus is five miles per hour
- All drivers are to stay in their cars and staff members will help your child get into the car

• If your student or any student in your carpool is not present when you come to pick up that student, a staff member will ask you to pull into a designated waiting area to keep the line moving

- Parents and guardians who are late to pick up their students must park and come to the front desk to sign out their child(ren)
- Families will be assessed a fee when they pick up between 4:15 and 5:00. The fee is \$25 per day
- SSCPS reserves the right to contact the local police and/or transport any student not picked up by 5:00 pm, or any student left waiting for longer than half an hour following a school based event
- Any person who does not cooperate with these procedures will be asked to meet with the Assistant Principals or Principal

Welcome back to another school year! As many of you know, students can borrow materials from the SSCPS library throughout the school year. Library materials are checked out to students during their regularly scheduled class library time.

Students may only borrow one item at a time, and items are checked out for a two week period. If a student forgets to bring back their materials, they may not check out any additional materials until those items are returned. Every year, your family receives a <u>Free and Reduced Price Meal Application</u> with <u>Instructions</u>. It is important to fill out this form and return it to school by *September 30*, *2019* for two reasons:

1. The application lets us know if your child is eligible for free or reduced price school meals. Children from families that earn below a certain income level can receive free or reduced price lunch and breakfast at school.

2. Applications we receive by *September 30, 2019* are used to determine federal and state entitlement grant funding our school receives for additional student services and academic materials for the upcoming school year.

3. School breakfast and lunch will energize your child's day and provide a healthy dose of vitamins and nutrients for a strong and healthy body. Students that eat healthy meals are more alert and learn more in class too.


