A Message from Nora Broderick



Dear Families and Colleagues,

I've been walking through the doors of our school for many years. Many of you know me, but for those who don't, my name is Nora Broderick and I'm the K-12 English Language Arts Curriculum Coordinator.

Reading is the foundation of all learning at our school. A struggling reader struggles everywhere. Our ELA teachers, from Kindergarten to 12th grade, are building the platform for all learning. From those beautiful Kindergarteners who need naps and have visits from the tooth fairy to 12th graders ready for college, work, life and beyond, our ELA teachers are an integral part of the success they will know in their lives.

It might surprise some families to discover that **listening** is the primary skill on the road to being a lifelong reader. Infants, babies, toddlers, and K's need to

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teachers illicit facts, opinions, ideas and understanding from our students by encouraging discussion during lessons. Opportunities to **speak and listen** in our ELA classrooms make books come alive and become part of students' lives beyond the classroom. Our K-8 ELA curriculum, Wit & Wisdom <u>www.greatminds.org</u> sponsors reading through topics as varied as libraries around the world, justice, history, science, poetry, novels, art and music. Our teachers reach into the curriculum to pull out ideas that our students read and talk about every day.

Reading brings pleasure, knowledge and understanding. By listening to Kassandra, Amy, Melissa and Kristen read, Kindergarteners learn about their own lives and the world around them. By teaching their students the sounds that make up words and how to use that skill to read other words, the Level 1 teachers give their students the cornerstone for all learning. Later 3rd, 4th and 5th graders gain more independence in their reading. 6th, 7th and 8th graders are taught to understand, analyze and create their own texts. In our high school, students learn about Shakespeare and texts that changed the world. They also sit for the SAT where all their ELA skills can help them find a college that brings higher learning. That brings us to the 4th reading skill: w**riting.**

When a 1st grader takes a pencil in her/his hand and makes those simple scratchings on paper, s/he is stepping into the challenging world of self-expression and creativity. That world continues into the College Board Pre-AP program our 9th graders are working with for the first time this year. Here they sharpen their listening, speaking, reading and writing skills and become savvy consumers and creators of traditional and digital texts.

All this makes sense on its own without reference to the Massachusetts Framework Document. This document outlines the learning standards expected of every public school in our state. What we do in our school is combine these standards with the goal of excellent teaching, knowledge, skill and commitment from our ELA teachers in their classrooms. The ELA curriculum is a K-12 learning continuum that seeks to prepare our students, through the highest Listening, Speaking, Reading and Writing standards, for everything that life has to offer: the gifts, the expectations, the assessments, the challenges and the opportunities in every aspect of their lives.

I love walking in the door of our school every day. I love the conversations, the people, the honesty and the love that's here. But, for me, the best thing of all is seeing a book in a child's hand and understanding written on that face. It just feels so good!
