A Message from Angie



At Kindergarten All Pod yesterday where students discussed the success of the food drive they sponsored as part of their study of the book, <u>Last Stop on Market Street</u>. Kindergarten students collected more than 150 nonperishable food items for donation to the <u>Friends of the Homeless of the South Shore!</u>

Next week marks the conclusion of the first quarter of the school year. The quarter officially closes on Thursday, October 31st and families of students in grades 5-12 can expect report cards to be sent home on Friday, November 8th. Students in grades K-4 are on a trimester schedule. Families can expect report cards for our youngest students to go home prior to the Thanksgiving break.



As we reach these milestones, we enter a critical point in the year for assessing student progress, planning for interventions, and making curricular adjustments. This requires data. One data point is the results of last spring's MCAS exams. Families with children who were in grades 3-10 last spring should have received MCAS results in the mail last week. These scores reflect the third year of the state's transition to the new, more rigorous, Next-Generation system of MCAS exams. Please take some time to review these results. While the exam does not give a full picture of student performance, it does provide a piece. If you're curious about the questions asked on the test, the Department of Elementary and Secondary Education has released some test items from last spring's exams here. You can see your child's responses to the questions on the key included in the score report. The DESE has also posted some resources for parents and guardians to help families understand this information. A slide show about the transition to Next-Gen MCAS, the scoring of the test, and the interpretation of results that is more specific to our school is available here.

The MCAS is only a snapshot in time and one data point, and results from these exams should be considered as part of a much larger picture. Teachers are continuously assessing student progress through traditional tests and quizzes as well as written assignments, projects, and performance tasks. Next week, teachers of students in grades 3-12 will begin administering formative assessments. Formative assessments are common among classrooms by grade level and subject, allowing us to see how all students are doing toward mastering content standards. Teams of teachers will spend time on the November 6th professional development half day working with the results from those assessments as well as with other data from their classrooms to determine how to reteach concepts that students are struggling with, provide additional support for students with gaps, and accelerate the curriculum in areas where students are exceeding expectations. This can mean adjustments to the whole group curriculum, targeted instruction for small groups, and individual interventions like tutoring. The flexibility of our Focused Instructional Time (FIT) schedule allows us to plan for much of this intervention during the school day. Student FIT schedules will change as we move into the second quarter, and eventually the second trimester, to allow our faculty to meet the determined

Last Wednesday before setting off for an expected long weekend, students in grade 9 took the PSAT 8/9 and students in grade 11 took the PSAT/NMSOT. Like the MCAS and our internal assessments, the PSAT provides our teachers with important data to guide instruction. The PSAT also gives students important practice with test taking. Standardized testing may not be the most glamorous or engaging aspect of education, but the vast majority of colleges still weigh the results of these exams when making admissions decisions. Some consider those scores as a small part of a bigger picture, while others weigh them more heavily. The experience of taking the PSAT is a crucial one for our students who are gaining exposure to both the content of the test and to the experience of taking a demanding, timed exam. The good news is that the Next-Generation MCAS aligns more closely with the **SAT** and **ACT** exams than the legacy MCAS exams did. Results from the PSAT will be available to our teachers and to families in December. Students in grades 8 and 10 will take the PSAT in the spring while all of our 11th grades will take an official SAT exam during a school day in April at no cost to families.

On an entirely different note, yesterday teachers distributed car tags to students in grades K-8. The purpose of the tags is the help facilitate the dismissal process at 100 Longwater Circle, a process we are always working to improve. Please display the tag on your windshield when you enter the dismissal line. This will help our dismissal staff get children into cars efficiently.
