A Message from Angie

Yesterday marked the end of the first trimester for our students in grades K-4. Report cards for our students in grades 1-4 will be distributed next Wednesday, November 27th, just as we break for Thanksgiving. Somehow, we are already a third of the way through the school year. Time is flying!

Our report card schedule reflects the developmental levels of our students. Report cards go home on a quarterly basis for students in grades 5-12. This matches the pattern that colleges expect to see on high school transcripts and allows for the scheduling of semester length courses. We send report cards home on a trimester schedule for students in grades 1-4. While these reports are less frequent, they provide parents with more narrative detail describing the progress of their children. Kindergarten report cards go home at the end of the second trimester and at the close of the year. Teachers share information about the transition to school and early progress of our Kindergarten students at fall parent-teacher conferences.

The reports that go home with our youngest students differ significantly from the report cards that we distributed to our 5-12 students. In grades 5-12, student progress is measured on a numerical scale that reflects performance on assessments, projects, classwork, and homework. Ultimately, those scores are reported on a traditional grade letter scale when we send high school grades to colleges. Details about grading for our older students can be found on page 11 of the <u>Student and Family Handbook</u>.



When teachers consider the progress of our youngest students, they look at how students are advancing toward meeting the grade level expectations outlined in the curriculum, rather than assigning a number or a letter. On our K-4 report cards, teachers break English Language Arts and Math down into clusters of standards that we draw from the <u>Massachusetts Curriculum Frameworks</u>. These areas reflect what students at that grade level should know and be able to do by the end of the year and are the focus of teaching and learning in our classrooms. Some areas on first trimester report cards are shaded and not reported on because those standards have yet to be addressed in the classroom. The math section of Level II report cards will change from term to term to reflect different standards addressed at different points in the school year.

Teachers rate student progress toward mastering standards using the terms, Not Yet, Progressing, Meets Expectations, or Above Expectations. When reading your child's report card please keep in mind that those expectations are end of year expectations. It is appropriate and expected for children to be only approaching mastery of these standards earlier in the school year as they will continue to work toward meeting the standards as the year progresses.




Outside of the academic content areas, teachers also report on Life Skills which include skills like organization, independence, respect, perseverance, and appropriately seeking help. This is your opportunity to get a sense of how your child interacts in the classroom and approaches his or her schoolwork. These skills are critical as our youngest students learn how to be students and set the stage for success in middle school, high school, and college.

Families have the opportunity to discuss student progress at parent-teacher conferences. We are holding conferences on Tuesday, December 3rd from 4:00 pm - 7:00 pm. You can expect

appointments at the middle school level are filling quickly. If a teacher that you would like to see is completely booked, please contact that teacher directly to book a phone appointment.
