A Message from Achille

This past year's challenge for all our math educators was to ensure a continued focus on the grade-level expectations to limit the potential skills gap due to the loss of instructional time. Our strategy for the year was prioritizing the mathematics standards and focusing on teaching key math concepts with greater depth. The mathematics standards have several domains and clusters; however, it is unnecessary to address every skill to achieve proficiency. Here is a list of some of the priority math skills covered this year for grades k to 8.

• Grades k-2:

- Develop fluency with representing, relating, and operating on whole numbers.
- Develop an understanding of addition, subtraction, and strategies for addition and subtraction.
- Understand whole number relationships and place value, including grouping in tens and ones.

• Grades 3-5:

- Develop an understanding of strategies for multiplication and division.
- Develop fluency with finding equivalent fractions, addition and subtraction of fractions with like denominators, and multiplication of fractions by whole numbers.

• Grades 6-8:

- Connect ratios and rates to whole number multiplication and division.
- Fluently write, interpret, and solve expressions, equations, and inequations.
- Develop an understanding of linear relationships and functions.
- Model real-world scenarios with inequalities, equations, and functions.

As a team, the K-8 math teachers did a fantastic job teaching these skills, which are the foundation for success in mathematics at the secondary level. The cumulative

nature of math stresses the importance of prior knowledge to acquire new concepts successfully. Online programs such as Khan Academy are valuable in supporting the retention of many essential math skills, especially during the summer vacation.

At the secondary level, we continue to see an increase in students placed into advanced math courses, including AP Calculus and AP Statistics. We are also noticing a positive trend in the number of students interested in STEM, especially computer science, engineering, and the medical field. We hope to continue this trend as we engage and help more students to become comfortable learning math.

I want to close by commending all staff members, students, and especially you, the parents, for your diligence, efforts, and commitment to education throughout this pandemic. As I reflect on all the positive outcomes this year, I think about an African proverb from Nigeria's Igbo tribe, "oran a ozu nwa" which translates to "it takes a village to raise a child." Meaningful parental involvement is critical to the success of our education system, and this pandemic raised our awareness regarding the value of family and community in educating a child. Thank you, parents, for your patience because many of you were the math co-teacher during the fully remote phase of the school year. I'm glad that some of you, who I had the opportunity to speak with, found some humor in your frustration to teach math at home, especially with these foreign approaches or strategies. As the math curriculum coordinator, I will work with the K-12 math team to ensure that you feel better equipped to support your role as a parent educator.

From the SSCPS Health Office

With the warmer weather out comes lots of bugs, including ticks. The students are outside more often this year, including for PE class. Please remember to check your student daily for ticks. The school is not allowed to apply bug spray or sunscreen to any student, so please apply at home, at your discretion.

As the weather gets warmer it is important to remember to have your student bring a refillable water bottle every day. There are water refilling stations located around the school

If your student has completed the Covid-19 vaccines, please send the paperwork to the appropriate health office. Students who are fully vaccinated will not be required to quarantine if they are deemed a close contact.

The Covid-19 vaccine is not mandatory.

If your child has a history of seasonal allergies and is experiencing their typical allergy symptoms such as nasal congestion, runny nose, sneezing, watery or red eyes they may still participate in person learning. Any student that has fever, vomiting, diarrhea or loss of smell or taste need to remain out of school and have a negative PCR COVID test before returning. Siblings need to remain out until the student has a negative PCR test.

The Health Office continues to run 2 separate COVID testing programs. Both of these tests are voluntary. In order to participate in each program you will need to sign up for them separately.

The BinaxNow Rapid Test is for students/staff that develop COVID-like symptoms while at school. This test can be administered at school and results are available in fifteen (15) minutes. Students/staff will still be required to leave school, even with a negative test result. Positive results are presumed positives and students will be required to isolate.

Pool Testing is a weekly COVID test for students and staff. Students will be tested on the weeks they are in person learning. This program is not available to remote students. Pool testing is when a number (usually 5-10) swabs are put in the same tube and a PCR test is done on the batch/pool.

If the pool comes back negative, it is presumed all individuals in this pool are negative.

If the pool comes back positive, each student is individually tested using the BinaxNow Rapid test done at school. Any positive students will be sent home to isolate and contact tracing will be done. If all students come back negative with the rapid testing, each student will then have an individual PCR test to be sent out from school. All students will be asked to quarantine until the PCR results come back.

When you sign consent for pool testing, you are consenting for all 3 types of testing to be done at school (pool testing, rapid antigen and individual PCR testing).
