A Message from Haley

Our World Language learners have been very busy this spring. In the past month, twenty students from the high school participated in the Seal of Biliteracy testing. These students tested in Spanish, Portuguese, German and Arabic. We have two seniors that have already qualified for the Seal of Biliteracy. Pending test results, we are very hopeful that several more of our seniors will be awarded the Seal at graduation this year. Look for updates in the fall about testing opportunities!

What is the Seal?

We are excited to now offer the Massachusetts Seal of Biliteracy to South Shore Charter Public School students. This is awarded to students who demonstrate proficiency in English (score of 501 on Next-Gen or 260 on Legacy on the English Language Arts grade 10 MCAS test) and at least one additional language. The Seal certifies that a student is proficient in all modes of a language, such as speaking, listening, reading and writing. Students can be assessed for language proficiency their junior or senior year or case by case as an underclassman. Qualified students will receive a seal on their high school transcript to signify the award along with a certificate of achievement.

Who can achieve the Seal?

Any student at SSCPS can apply and work toward attaining the Seal of Biliteracy. The Seal can be awarded for any world language studied at SSCPS or any heritage language learned at home. In order to attain the required proficiency level at SSCPS, students should plan to take four consecutive years of the language and will test their junior and/or senior year. Heritage speakers should be prepared to demonstrate proficiency in both spoken and written language and can test as early as freshman year.

How does the Seal benefit students?

Knowing a second language and understanding other cultures increases students' marketability to both universities and employers. In our global society, cultural competency and language proficiency have become essential skills for the workplace and are required in many fields. The Seal of Biliteracy rewards students who value cultural awareness and can apply their language abilities to real-life settings. The Massachusetts Department of Education is working diligently to present to colleges and universities about the Seal. The list of colleges and universities that accept the Seal continues to grow. Those that currently accept the Seal for credit can be found <u>here</u>. Students who obtain the Seal are encouraged to advocate for credit upon entering their undergraduate degree. World Language Requirements

At SSCPS, the high school requirement for language is two years, although we encourage students to continue with a language all four years. Taking four years of the same language gives students eligibility to test for the Seal of Biliteracy, as well as prepares them for college-level language courses. Not all colleges and universities expect students to have the same number of years of studying a foreign language. Some require or recommend two years; others ask for three. Many recommend that you actually commit to the component for all four years of high school. The recommendations and requirements from colleges and universities in regards to language varies and should be reviewed by students and families. Recommendation vs. Requirement

In general, competitive colleges require at least two years of world language classes in high school. These classes should be in the same language—colleges would much prefer to see proficiency in one language, rather than a jump from language to language. When a college recommends "two or more" years of a language, they are clearly signaling that going beyond those two years of language study would <u>strengthen your application</u>. No matter where you apply for college, a demonstrated proficiency in a second language will improve your chances of admission. Life in college and after college is becoming increasingly globalized, so strength in a second language carries a lot of weight with admissions counselors.

From the SSCPS Health Office

With the warmer weather out comes lots of bugs, including ticks. The students are outside more often this year, including for PE class. Please remember to check your student daily for ticks. The school is not allowed to apply bug spray or sunscreen to any student, so please apply at home, at your discretion.

As the weather gets warmer it is important to remember to have your student bring a refillable water bottle every day. There are water refilling stations located around the school

If your student has completed the Covid-19 vaccines, please send the paperwork to the appropriate health office. Students who are fully vaccinated will not be required to quarantine if they are deemed a close contact.

The Covid-19 vaccine is not mandatory.

If your child has a history of seasonal allergies and is experiencing their typical allergy symptoms such as nasal congestion, runny nose, sneezing, watery or red eyes they may still participate in person learning. Any student that has fever, vomiting, diarrhea or loss of smell or taste need to remain out of school and have a negative PCR COVID test before returning. Siblings need to remain out until the student has a negative PCR test.

The Health Office continues to run 2 separate COVID testing programs. Both of these tests are voluntary. In order to participate in each program you will need to sign up for them separately.

The BinaxNow Rapid Test is for students/staff that develop COVID-like symptoms while at school. This test can be administered at school and results are available in fifteen (15) minutes. Students/staff will still be required to leave school, even with a negative test result. Positive results are presumed positives and students will be required to isolate.

Pool Testing is a weekly COVID test for students and staff. Students will be tested on the weeks they are in person learning. This program is not available to remote students. Pool testing is when a number (usually 5-10) swabs are put in the same tube and a PCR test is done on the batch/pool.

If the pool comes back negative, it is presumed all individuals in this pool are negative.

If the pool comes back positive, each student is individually tested using the BinaxNow Rapid test done at school. Any positive students will be sent home to isolate and contact tracing will be done. If all students come back negative with the rapid testing, each student will then have an individual PCR test to be sent out from school. All students will be asked to quarantine until the PCR results come back.

When you sign consent for pool testing, you are consenting for all 3 types of testing to be done at school (pool testing, rapid antigen and individual PCR testing).
