### A Message from Joe ...

We learned a lot about ourselves as educators from our first experiences with remote learning this past spring. One thing we did learn was that we had to be better at delivering our lessons online. Over the summer, all teachers spent multiple weeks of

Professional Development learning about and reviewing different apps, websites, and online education platforms to better themselves as online educators. All teachers became certified Google Educators, to be able to master the many educational tools Google offers to enhance our synchronous lessons. As we continued into the school year, teachers utilized their new tools to enhance their past lesson plans by integrating more technology, so students can access from home and the classroom. They engage our students, while still using their new tools to assess the students to ensure progress is being made in the virtual classroom. I have asked the High School teachers to share some ways they are integrating technology into their lessons.

"I rely heavily on Youtube (www.Youtube.com) videos in US History...the students arrive in the Meet they see my shared screen of a Google Slides to show the schedule for the day. I also use Youtube to play a song from the time period we are covering. Youtube adds a little more texture to the lessons and also it's nice to start a class with music playing while I'm going through attendance...Nearpod (nearpod.com) allows me to build presentations in powerpoint format. I can also insert videos and insert questions within the video (multiple choice, open response). For quiz review, I use the Time to Climb game in Nearpod where the students get points for getting the answer correct but also the quickest. Also, I utilize Google Forms (google.com/forms/about) to give online quizzes and Edulastic (edulastic.com) for quizzes or classwork with their pre-built assignments for social studies. It has amazing analytics to track student progress and identify areas that I will need to reinforce with the whole class." - Michael Forrester, US History

"In History, Grades 9-11 are using online textbooks that include interactive maps, embedded questions, videos, photographs, timelines, primary source documents, digital notes, graphic organizers, and review materials. The text can be read aloud to students in two languages and will highlight the text so that students can read along...Of course, teachers are also using Google Classroom to a fuller extent to share assignments, provide feedback, grade, etc. I had students make a "We the People" collage one morning, and it was cool to be able to see the collages created in real time by clicking into the student copies. I also liked a project students did to teach others about the First Amendment, social media algorithms, what teens should know about news and media literacy, or best practices in journalism. Many of them created great slideshows and then added audio by recording a presentation... teachers have used news and media literacy sites, such as Checkology (checkology.org), that are interactive. Tom and I have used it to teach students focusing on the First Amendment, best practices in journalism, social media algorithms, and uncovering bias." -Kristen Mullin-Connolly, History Curriculum Coordinator

"Since September, the high school transition class has been working on and practicing "The Genius Hour". Genius Hour was modeled after Google's model of allowing their employees to spend 20% of their time working on any passion project they wanted. On Fridays students are asked to work on a passion project of their own choosing. This project is all theirs. They are learning to plan, organize, create and sometimes find out that they need to start all over...again. This is done with guided support. When SSCPS announced that it wasn't having a workshop this year Genius Hour seemed like a great way to keep students focused on what interests them while gaining skills about research, planning, organization and creating a product to share with others. "Recently in Human Biology, students were learning about the tonicity (shape) of cells in different environments. Rather than have students conduct a laboratory investigation in person, I was able to use a document camera to show them live results of a raw egg in different solutions over time. Students were still able to make observations, collect data, and apply what they had learned to analyze the results. Other technologies used in Human Biology include Edpuzzle (edpuzzle.com), where comprehension questions and notes can be embedded into video to assess student understanding. Flipgrid (flipgrid.com) is a system where students record videos of themselves responding to a post by the teacher. Pronouncing and enunciating scientific terminology is something I miss doing with students in person, and Flipgrid has provided a decent solution." -Emily Merwin, Human Biology and AP Biology

"I'm splitting my screen using the Dualless app. It allows me to watch student work being done in real time in Google Classroom. I can comment on the student as she/he writes and ensure everyone is on task. I can grade students right away or I can allow them to continue working on the assignment in FIT. The whole group can hear my comments as I move through each student's work but if I need to give a private comment I can just send it via Google Classroom." -Nora Broderick, ELA Curriculum Coordinator

"Speech and Communication delivered speeches virtually; topics ranged from graduation speeches to Maid of Honor/Best Man speeches, eulogies, and award presentations. Afterward we had a class debate on topics the classes voted on. Both classes did a phenomenal job of setting up their reasons, backing it up with research, and making their cases clear. I was especially impressed with their ability to conduct all of this using breakout rooms in Google Meet to prepare, and delivering all arguments virtually...AP students have had discussions virtually, using post-its on Jamboard (https://edu.google.com/products/jamboard/), and sharing Google Docs so everyone can write on it. We just completed a practice exam through Google Forms to provide a baseline of skills." -Katie Cianelli, Speech and Communications and AP Language and Composition









"Technology: Google slides, docs & forms, document camera, QUIZIZZ (quizizz.com) DeltaMath (www.deltamath.com), & Khan Academy (www.khanacademy.org). Hoping to incorporate more as time goes... in Geometry we are working on proofs, both Algebraic and Geometric Proofs. The focus is for students to show all their work and justify each step. I use the analogy of filing a tax return to explain the need to justify each step. As we know, the US Government will not accept a check or issue a check to a taxpayer without completing a 1040 form which justifies the why." -Ellen English, Geometry

"I've been using Google's Jamboard, which are basically white boards that either the entire class can work on collectively or each student can have their own. Students can write out formulas and operations when typing them just does not work...With a Jamboard, students can share their screens right in the Google Meet and I can see where they are stuck. If they do not want to share their shortcomings with the entire class, I can go to their Jamboard on my computer and see their work and even add my own notes...Two other bits of technology I have used are from math based websites such as Desmos and Deltamath. Desmos.com offers great interactive activities that students can work through on their own. These activities give students the opportunity to develop understanding through their own math experience. Deltamath is a great tool for homework. I can pick from a collection of topics and assign problems based on what we went over in class. If a student gets a problem wrong the site offers a step by step explanation as to how the problem should be solved. Independence is a big part of remote learning and having these explanations is much better than being told your answer is incorrect." -Greg Roaf, Algebra II

"The World Language department has used increasingly more technology this year to expose students to more authentic materials in Spanish and French. Edpuzzle has been used regularly for short lessons and comprehension checks. Students can watch videos in the target language while answering questions along the way. Flipgrid and screencastify give students the opportunity to record presentations and pose questions for others to then respond to. Teachers have been getting creative with podcasts, music and web articles for interpretive activities. We have also been having fun learning vocabulary with games like Kahoot, Gimkit, Booklet and Quizlet." -Haley Edmondson, World Languages Curriculum Coordinator

# IMPORTANT Weekly COVID-19 Health Report Released on Thursday

The <u>Massachusetts Department of Public Health Weekly COVID-19 Report</u>, including the city/town data and map, will be posted on Thursday evening. The next report is November12, 2020.

The weekly report provides the count and rate of confirmed COVID-19 cases and tests, including the daily incidence rate in Massachusetts cities and towns over the last two weeks. We use this data as one way to determine if our school needs to transition learning models. If over 25 percent of our student population municipalities turn red, the school will transition to or sustain full remote learning.

Our sending district student populations are as follows:

Weymouth 26% Randolph 21% Brockton 11% Rockland 9% Hanover 3%

These calculations mean the following:

Weymouth red = Full Remote Learning

Randolph + Rockland red = Full Remote Learning

Brockton + Randolph red = Full Remote Learning

District student percentage must add up to 25% or more to activate the transition to full remote learning. Last week one of our sending districts was deemed red by the Massachusetts Department of Public Health.

The school has transitioned back to hybrid and in-person learning. We will be sending email notification to all families Thursday afternoon or evening with updates regarding the current COVID-19 district metrics. Please be sure your contact information has been updated with the school by completing your emergency contact information.

#### COVID-19 Check


