A Message from Angie

We find ourselves in mid-March enjoying the sunny days of early spring as we work through a critical stretch of teaching and learning. Students in grades K-4 ended their second trimester last week. Report cards went home with students yesterday afternoon. Please check your child's backpack for this important report if you have yet to see it. Meanwhile, tenth grade students at the high school are completing the second and final day of English Language Arts MCAS testing today. Grades three through nine will soon follow as testing season is officially underway. Please find the full MCAS schedule below.

Mid-March also brings the return of programming for students in grades one and two at <u>Holly Hill Farm</u> after a winter hiatus. Last week our first graders started the spring season, followed by second grade students this week. Children eagerly pulled on their boots, boarded the school bus, and ventured

on their much anticipated first trip of the spring. On arrival, students felt their feet sink into the mud as they saw the farm transformed, a completely different landscape from the crisp air and bright leaves that they left in the fall, and the icy, white fields they explored during their winter walk. Their first conversations with the farm educators were about the evidence of seasonal change all around them.



During this month's visits, students learned about decomposers and their role in the ecosystem. They took a woods walk to find evidence of decomposers at work as they asked questions about the importance of these organisms to life on the farm. Students visited the composting station where they observed the differences between compost piles at different stages of decomposition, took the temperature of the piles to learn about the energy involved in the transformation waste, and sifted the finished compost so that it would be ready to use. Students then moved to the garden beds and cleaned out the leaves and seaweed they had spread in the fall to protect the beds. They spread the fresh compost so that the beds would be ready for them to plant on their next visit.



The curriculum at the farm is designed to engage students in science practices in a hands-on way that makes science both relevant and exciting. Our teachers have worked closely with the farm educators to develop a curriculum that allows them to deliver the bulk of the standards outlined in the Massachusetts Science and Technology/Engineering Curriculum Framework during visits to the farm. Our commitment to outdoor education has not wavered despite the easing of COVID mandates.



The South Shore Charter Public School has partnered with Holly Hill Farm for over twenty years. Our relationship with the farm is tied to their outstanding school programs, but this is only one aspect of the work done by the institution. Holly Hill, the last working farm in Cohasset, was recently recognized by the Smithsonian Institution when it was accepted into the Smithsonian Institution's Archive of American Gardens. As a result, information about the farm and images from the gardens are now available in the Smithsonian Online Virtual Archives. The Cohasset Mariner ran a story about the farm and this most recent honor that can be found here. We are proud of our continued partnership with the team at Holly Hill.

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



What's Happening in Projects and Workshops?

The Master Your Voice Workshop







The *Master Your Voice* Workshop focuses on vocal exercises for 15/20 minutes everyday to develop strength and agility of vocal folds, breath control, and posture. Students are studying the physiology of the body parts which contribute to the production of sound. Students have started working on their EOM, which will be the recording of "Peter Pan" in audiobook format. The pictures show the preparation, research, practice of student parts, and the recording session in action. Students are recording the audiobook in ProTools, the industry standard for audio recording, and the recording process will take at least another couple of weeks. When the recording is finished, students will focus on "post production" and do editing, enhancing the sound to a professional standard through the use of compressors, noise gates, equalizers, etc. The audiobook will be shared with the lower levels at SSCPS.

At-Home Rapid Antigen Testing (NEW opt-in form)

- 1. At-Home Rapid Antigen Testing on Sunday (NEW opt-in form)
- 2. Routine COVID Safety Checks every week (If you have not yet signed up, <u>click here</u>. If you are setting up a secondary account, please put the code: **KDHEHV** under the organization code.)
- 3. **Symptomatic Testing** (If you have not yet signed up, click here)

Overview: At-Home Rapid Testing Program

- About the Test: <u>iHealth</u> is a 15-minute at-home FDA-approved rapid antigen test
- Opt-In: To participate, you must opt in by completing the form. By opting in, you will agree to review the training materials for test administration, report positive test results to your student's school, and administer the tests according to SSCPS Health Office guidelines.
- Weekly: Every two weeks you will receive an iHealth at-home rapid test kit.
 Each kit contains two individual tests. Your student will administer one test each week on Sunday.
- Reporting Positive Test Results: If your student tests positive on an at-home
 antigen test, you will inform their school of the positive result using the
 [Positive Test Result Notification form]. The school will keep the results
 confidential and will not make individual results public. In addition, it is strongly
 recommended that you inform your healthcare professional of the positive
 result.

Easy, Free, and Flexible: This test is administered at home (not at school),
reducing the burden on school staff and time to administer tests and increasing
a family's flexibility to do testing in the home for free.

How do I submit results?

- Submit Results: You must submit positive test results to your student's school. <u>Click here</u> to submit positive test results.
- Confidentiality: Positive test results are shared with your school district for informational purposes only. Individual results will remain confidential, and they will never be made public.

Free COVID-19 Vaccine Clinic & Test Site

Beginning on Tuesday February 8, 2022, the Town of Marshfield is offering a COVID 19 vaccine and testing site at the Marshfield Fairgrounds 61 South River Street in Marshfield. The clinic is open for all Plymouth County residents on Tuesdays, Thursdays, and Saturdays from 9am-3pm. Appointments can be made by logging onto www.marshfieldcares.com or the service is also available for walk-ins. The clinic has all 3 vaccines and boosters, if you have your vaccination card, please bring it with you. The vaccinations and test are done through a drive-thru operation that is free and convenient.
