## A Message from Kristen

On Monday, May 29, we remember and honor Americans who made the ultimate sacrifice in service to our country. Memorial Day originated as a commemoration of those who lost their lives during the Civil War, and it became a federal holiday in 1971. Some still refer to it as Decoration Day due to the tradition of decorating graves with wreaths, flowers, and flags. Students may learn more about the history of Memorial Day in their classes. As you enjoy the weekend, consider asking your student about the holiday.

History and social studies teachers have filled the year with interesting field trips and challenging scholastic opportunities in addition to routine instruction that inspires students to excel in academics, service, and life. Several special events occur in the spring.

#### Grade 5 Living Wax Museum

Many fifth graders look forward to the living wax museum all year. With help from the maintenance team, Deb Sloan and her students transformed the physical education space at 104 Longwater Drive on Friday, May 19 so that Level II classes and Grade 5 families could learn more about historical figures. Visitors watched as wax figures became animated and shared biographical information.

#### **Civics Projects & Field Trips**

Many history and social studies teachers participated in civics professional development throughout the year, including sessions facilitated by Facing History and Ourselves, a non-profit organization. In grades 8 and 12, students complete a civics action project. The project requires students to identify a community issue, research it, develop an action plan, implement it, and reflect on their progress. To help prepare for their projects, eighth graders traveled to the Edward M. Kennedy Institute for the U.S. Senate in the fall while

seniors visited the State House in the spring. Some students discussed their projects with state legislators.

Eighth graders are finishing their civics projects, and families are invited to attend the Grade 8 Civics Project Showcase on Friday, June 9. Teacher Nick Kerrigan will email families with more information.

This past weekend several eighth graders visited Washington, D.C. In addition to visiting the U.S. Capitol, the U.S. Holocaust Memorial Museum, the National Museum of African American History and Culture, Arlington National Cemetery, and the National Mall, students enjoyed a dance cruise on the Potomac River. Other eighth graders visited Boston and toured the State House, the Boston Common, and the New England Holocaust Memorial.

### **Financial Literacy Initiatives**

Juniors and seniors participated in a financial literacy fair in April. They completed the Credit for Life program and interacted with panelists, including Sarah Valentini, chief executive officer and co-founder of Radius Financial Group, Inc.; Julie Beckham, financial education officer at Rockland Trust and host of the *No Shame in This Money Game* podcast; and Drew Coveney, certified public accountant from Wolf & Company, P.C. The fair challenged students to simulate financial decisions they might make in their mid-twenties.

Junior Jordan Alexandre noted that "Going through the Credit For Life program was really useful for understanding things like leasing a car. I was talking to my teacher Mike about different options and considering how to balance my needs and wants."

Junior Pierre Joseph commented that "Talking to the panelists opened my eyes to how I can save money and build a strong credit history."

In addition to the high school fair, several workshops, projects, and classes have benefited from financial literacy instruction.

#### Advanced Placement® Classes


#### **Summer Reading**







# **MASSHEALTH REDETERMINATIONS**



Starting April 1, 2023, MassHealth will begin the eligibility redetermination process, renewing all 2.3M members over the following 12 months. This will generally be the first-time members are at risk of losing their coverage since February 2020. In preparation for this effort, MassHealth has increased staffing significantly to handle a greater volume of calls and applications, improved our systems to automatically renew as many members' coverage as possible, and is working in close collaboration with health plans, providers, and other stakeholders. Even with this preparation, we understand that this may be difficult for members.

# FROM THE HEALTH OFFICE

With spring upon us the health office wanted to send out some reminders.

- Caffeinated beverages are not allowed in the K through 8 building. This includes coffee, energy drinks and soda.
- Please make sure to check your students for ticks daily, although students are not allowed in the woods, ticks can travel.
- Sunscreen and bug spray can not be applied at school. Please apply bug spray or sunscreen before sending your student to school in the morning.
- Please send your students to school daily with a reusable water bottle.
- Level I students should have a complete change of clothes in their backpacks.

Please keep your students home if they have any off the following symptoms/illness

- Fever greater than 100.0
- Vomiting/diarrhea in last 24 hours
- Not able to manage cough/nasal congestion
- Test positive for COVID

When can my student return to school

- Fever free for 24 hours without medication (if you give Tylenol or Motrin in the morning, please keep student home from school)
- No vomiting/diarrhea for 24 hours
- Well enough to stay at school for the day
