A Message from Mary



The Fall is a very busy time for the high school guidance department. Our Guidance team is made of two counselors, Stephanie Chery who is our grade 9 and 10 counselor and myself as the Director and Grade11 and 12 counselor. From freshmen to seniors, we have worked hard to help our students transition back to school and prepare for life after high school. The freshman focus has been adjusting to high school both academically and socially. To support that, the freshman class went on a community building trip to Tree Top Adventures. The sophomore class went on a college tour of UMass Dartmouth in October the same day as the Junior class was taking the PSAT Exam at SSCPS.

The Seniors have been working on college applications, graduation requirements and exit standards ... just to name a few things!



To kick off Senior year, we held a "Senior Bootcamp" in September that included a college panel as well as mini sessions on how to organize Common App, CollegeBoard, and Naviance. College representatives from eight colleges participated in our Senior Bootcamp. Representatives from UMass Amherst, UMass Dartmouth, Fitchburg State University, Bridgewater State, Curry College, Bentley University, Mass Maritime Academy, and Massasoit Community College presented on the application process, new programs at their institutions, and answered questions from the students. This is a wonderful opportunity for Seniors to connect with colleges as the school year starts and get them excited about applying to colleges.

In October, we hosted two "On the Spot" Admission Events before the November 1st deadline. Part of our Early Application initiative is to have "On the Spot" Admission Events throughout the Fall to help students feel comfortable about the admission process. An "On the Spot" Admission Event is when a college Admissions Representative comes to our school and meets with students individually to review the transcript and go over the application process. At the end of the meeting, if the student meets all of the admission criteria, the Admissions Representative offers an acceptance. If the student needs to work on some areas and wants to see mid-year grades, the Admissions Representative will add the student to the regular admission cycle, or work on a plan to have the student eligible for admission at a later date. The decision is never no, but rather, not now.



On October 17th, we had 16 students participate in the Bridgewater State University admission event and on October 21st, we had 11 students participate in the one for Curry College. All 26 students received an acceptance letter! There are two more "On the Spot" events before the end of the year - Massasoit Community College will be here on November 29th and Salem State will be here on December 6th.

November 1st is a major milestone for seniors as it is the first official Early Action deadline for college applications. Early Action is when a student applies early to a college (typically Nov 1 or Nov 15) and hears back from the college before January 2023. This is non binding acceptance, meaning that a student can apply to many different colleges Early Action, get accepted, but not make a decision on a college acceptance until May 1st. *Early Decision* is when a student applies early and if accepted, the student must withdraw applications from other colleges and commit to the Early Decision college.



To date, Guidance has processed over 200 applications with 50% of the senior class applying Early Action. The next application deadline is December 1st. So as you sit around your Thanksgiving table, if you are lucky enough to have a high school senior, make sure you ask them how they are doing and not too much about the application process. They have had a rollercoaster of emotions this Fall and need family support and understanding.

Guest Speaker Dr. Ejike Eze



Dr. Ejike Eze gave a presentation on the Igbo Culture on November 18th for students in Mrs. Sullivan's World Literature classes and the Cultural Diversity Workshop. Igbo is one of Nigeria's three official languages. Students were engaged in learning how the culture and customs have evolved as they read the World Literature text *Things Fall Apart* by Chinua Achebe. Dr. Eze's presentation explained how through his writing, Achebe sheds light on how the Igbo were forced to adopt to Western civilization and the resulting struggle. *Things Fall Apart* provides excellent examples of several Igbo traditional customs.

NEWEST UPDATE

COVID-19 tests will be sent home this week! The Department of Elementary and Secondary Education has provided each student with a total of four COVID-19 tests to bring home. This is free of charge and you can use the tests at your discretion. This will be a onetime program that DESE is offering. You do not have to do anything to participate, but if you would like to opt out please send an email to jkjelgaard@sscps.org.

The health office will begin doing vision and hearing screens on students in 1st through 5th grade and also 7th graders. We will also begin doing height and weight screenings on 1st, 4th, 7th, and 10th graders. If you would like to opt your student out of the screenings please send an email to Jaime Kjelgaard, RN at jkjelgaard@sscps.org for 1st through 8th grade students or Barbara Folan, RN at bfolan@sscps.org for high school students.

All 4th, 7th and 11th graders should have a current physical (within the last 12 months) on file in the appropriate health office. All students playing sports must have a current physical in order to play.

Massachusetts Chapter

American Academy of Pediatrics

November 1, 2022

Dear Families,

The Commonwealth, the Northeast and much of the US are seeing increases in respiratory illness in infants and children. Some of these infants and children are requiring hospitalization for support with breathing and hydration. Emergency departments and other acute care health facilities have been managing significant increases in the number of patients requiring care.

Most of these illnesses are caused by respiratory viral infections, including common seasonal viruses like respiratory syncytial virus (RSV), rhinovirus and enterovirus, and influenza. Infants and children may be particularly susceptible to seasonal respiratory viral infections during the 2022-2023 fall and winter because they have had limited previous exposure to these respiratory viruses. We anticipate that there could be more respiratory illnesses as RSV continues to spread and influenza eason ramps up.

The Department of Public Health and the Massachusetts Chapter of the American Academy of Pediatrics want to remind parents and families about steps to take to prevent illness and stay healthy this season:

- 1. Vaccinate your children ages 6 months and older against influenza as soon as possible.
- Vaccinate your children ages 6 months and older against COVID-19; children 5 and older who had their primary series more than 2 months ago should receive an updated COVID-19 booster as soon as possible.
- 3. Remember, you can get a COVID-19 vaccine and flu shot at the same time.
- If your infant has been offered treatment with protective antibodies due to their prematurity or another condition, keep on schedule with their monthly treatments.
- Practice hand hygiene frequently with soap and water or hand sanitizer. Cover coughs and sneezes with a tissue, or if a tissue is not available, cover them with an elbow, not a hand.
- 6. Clean high touch surfaces in your home frequently with household disinfectants.
- Keep children home from daycare or school who have fever, especially with a cough, difficulty breathing or shortness of breath, congestion, runny nose, or sore throat, until they are fever-free for 24 hours without medications that reduce fever.
- 8. Avoid social gatherings if you or your children are ill.
- Contact your pediatrician or healthcare provider if you believe your child needs medical care. Your provider can offer advice on whether your child needs to be evaluated in person, tested for COVID or flu, and the best location (doctor's office, urgent care, emergency room) for care.

Thank you for doing all you can to keep you and your family healthy during this fall and winter season.
