A Message from Nora

We All Teach Literacy

"When I look back, I am so impressed with the life-giving power of literature."

Maya Angelou

At our recent Open House I chatted with a family eager to have their child be part of our school. Their daughter politely interrupted us to ask if playing was allowed in Kindergarten and, if so, for how long. What's clear in this interaction is that the child has already achieved a high level of literacy. She understood:

- 1. That we were having a conversation: that's Listening
- 2. That she needed to speak clearly to be understood: that's Speaking
- 3. That questioning leads to knowledge: that's Comprehension

Listening, speaking, and comprehension can happen in all social interactions: at home, at sporting events, in Target, on a bus, at the beach, even reading a menu. The structured environment of the classroom does not need to be the only way to build literacy. For many inspiring Kindergarten students, their next step in literacy will be another introduction to reading. Right now the Level I & II teachers are participating in professional development with *Keys to Literacy*. The professional development, **Keys to Beginning Reading**, is a comprehensive, multi-module program in the teaching of early reading.

The curated skill development that our teachers are working on during professional development will mean that students fortunate enough to win a spot in Kindergarten will be taught by highly qualified reading teachers who are learning and honing all the skills necessary to teach literacy.









Literacy is Foundational

Learning the language of science and math is vital. Being able to read a question with comprehension, understand the very particular symbols in math and science, and the ability to explain processes and results are intrinsic to literacy. I remember when Kristen Gale taught ELA in Level II she led a very successful FIT that explored the vocabulary of science. Students were taught vocabulary and then how to identify the words in questions and how to create their own questions using the vocabulary of science. From chatting to math teachers and listening to students in grades 5-8, I know that math literacy is valued. Students need to be able to speak their math, explore math questions, discuss processes with each other and be comfortable in the language of math.

At the high school, where 9th graders are following a physics program in their science classes, ELA teachers often find the time to ask what students are learning in science: What physics words do you know? Can you talk about what you worked on in physics class today? What is physics all about? These big picture questions take very little time, but bring an element of ELA to our science program in the ELA classroom. The key here is for all of us to know that we are all teaching literacy all the time.

Alicia recently brought to my attention a curriculum that combines writing, empathy and self-expression: **The Max Warburg Courage Curriculum**

Students read short essays written by students in grades 6-8. The essays speak about the moments of courage that have changed student lives. At the end of the writing program, students write their own essays that have the possibility of being included in the curriculum as it moves forward.

Writing is an essential component of literacy. It give students the opportunity for self-expression in an open-ended curriculum that values their experiences and their individual responses to texts and conversations in the classroom.






It may well be that we have the opportunity to combine the Max Warburg Courage Curriculum with our own amazing ELA curriculum to extend the writing program to include significant moments in our students' lives.

Teaching literacy gives all of us the opportunity to teach the very human need to listen, to understand, to express and to create. Literacy is the foundational tool in our mission of inspiring every student to excel in academics, service, and life.

All 4th, 7th and 11th graders should have a current physical (within the last 12 months) on file in the appropriate health office. All students playing sports must have a current physical in order to play.

Dear Families,

The Commonwealth, the Northeast and much of the US are seeing increases in respiratory illness in infants and children. Some of these infants and children are requiring hospitalization for support with breathing and hydration. Emergency departments and other acute care health facilities have been managing significant increases in the number of patients requiring care.

Most of these illnesses are caused by respiratory viral infections, including common seasonal viruses like respiratory syncytial virus (RSV), rhinovirus and enterovirus, and influenza. Infants and children may be particularly susceptible to seasonal respiratory viral infections during the 2022-2023 fall and winter because they have had limited previous exposure to these respiratory viruses. We anticipate that there could be more respiratory illnesses as RSV continues to spread and influenza season ramps up.

The Department of Public Health and the Massachusetts Chapter of the American Academy of Pediatrics want to remind parents and families about steps to take to prevent illness and stay healthy this season:

- 1. Vaccinate your children ages 6 months and older against influenza as soon as possible.
- Vaccinate your children ages 6 months and older against COVID-19; children 5 and older who had their primary series more than 2 months ago should receive an updated COVID-19 booster as soon as possible.
- 3. Remember, you can get a COVID-19 vaccine and flu shot at the same time.
- 4. **If your infant has been offered treatment with protective antibodies** due to their prematurity or another condition, keep on schedule with their monthly treatments.
- Practice hand hygiene frequently with soap and water or hand sanitizer. Cover coughs and sneezes with a tissue, or if a tissue is not available, cover them with an elbow, not a hand
- 6. Clean high touch surfaces in your home frequently with household disinfectants.
- 7. **Keep children home from daycare or school** who have fever, especially with a cough, difficulty breathing or shortness of breath, congestion, runny nose, or sore throat, until they are fever-free for 24 hours without medications that reduce fever.
- 8. Avoid social gatherings if you or your children are ill.

Contact your pediatrician or healthcare provider if you believe your child needs
medical care. Your provider can offer advice on whether your child needs to be
evaluated in person, tested for COVID or flu, and the best location (doctor's office,
urgent care, emergency room) for care.

Thank you for doing all you can to keep you and your family healthy during this fall and winter season.
