We are eager to celebrate our newest class of graduates at the 29th Commencement Exercises of the South Shore Charter Public School this Friday night. Graduation at South Shore Charter Public School truly is a celebration of our entire community and it is the culmination of many years of hard work on the part of students, families, and teachers. The end of the year is full of exciting events and milestones for our students but commencement is what all of us, K-12, are ultimately working toward. I would like to congratulate our soon to be graduates, their families, and all of the teachers who have supported them throughout their K-12 academic careers. For the first time, this year's graduation will take place away from our campus in the ballroom of the Campus Center at UMass Boston. The move to this location is a year in the making as members of the Class of 2024 began to research possible venues last June. The impetus to move graduation indoors was strong for these students as many were

instrumental in the cleanup efforts last year, wiping rainwater off of chairs when a powerful thunderstorm cut the ceremony short. This week we are able to concentrate on the many ways we are celebrating our Seniors and are not religiously following Friday's weather forecast.

Health Office Update

Medication pick up for grades 1st through 8th grade will be at drop off and dismissal on Thursday, June 13th, Friday, June 14th and Monday, June 17th. If these times do not work for you, please email <u>jkjelgaard@sscps.org</u> to arrange another time for pick up. Please remember that an adult needs to pick up the medication and it can not be sent home with students on the bus. Any medication that is not picked up by the end of the school year will be properly disposed of.

If your student is attending a summer program please reach out to the health office.

In compliance with the regulations of the Massachusetts Department of Public Health all students entering Kindergarten, 4th, 7th and 10th grade for the 2024/2025 school year are required to submit a current physical form. A physical form and a copy of immunization records is required for all new students. Any student planning on participating in a sports program must have a current physical (within 13 months of the start of the sport).





Here is a brief description of the MaxCourage mission:

The mission of MAXCourage is to empower students to discover the value of courage and develop English Language Arts (ELA) proficiency. The program, through its mission, helps students recognize their capacity to address the troubling complexities of their world by exploring the concept of courage in literature, in their own lives, and in the broader community. At the same time, this SEL approach strengthens their literacy skills. MAXCourage's overarching vision is to provide a model ELA curriculum which empowers students to learn about and continue to exhibit courage in their lives, and which inspires others to make bolder and more courageous choices.

OFFER encouragement to your children to keep track of their items.


SAVE your sanity.
