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## A Message from John

We are entering that time of the year when many teachers and students start to prepare for a Thanksgiving meal with friends and family. Accompanying this meal is a 4-day weekend to spend time with loved ones. Many will be traveling near and far. Some are decorating their homes in anticipation of guests, and others have already started cooking side dishes,

desserts, and more. Like clockwork, students in schools all over the country will be spending this short week learning about the Pilgrims on the Mayflower, the Wampanoag tribes that were here when they arrived, and discussing what was really eaten at the original Thanksgiving Feast.

Hopefully, amidst all of this revelry, we find time to reflect on what we are thankful for in our lives. For myself, I am so full of gratitude to be working at a school that, in my time here, continues to change and adapt. SSCPS is at times a living organization that is constantly trying to meet the tide of new students we receive every year with grace and understanding. We are a school that now boasts a nearly 50% multilingual rate. We are a school that both accepts and celebrates diversity of all kinds at our school. Although our mission statement has remained the same for many years, we remain open, optimistic, and full of wonder toward meeting the constant shifts in our student population and what is being taught in our classrooms. We are a living and adapting community.







SSCPS is a school that has a front seat to many of the shifts in teaching that alter how we look back at our nation's history. From Lexington to Concord, to the Battle of Bunker Hill, to the self-proclaimed "Living Museum" of Plimoth Patuxet, students and teachers are challenging many of the stereotypes and singular beliefs that many of us were taught growing up in the area. Last week, in tandem with the 3rd Grade Social Studies curriculum,

about 80 students were able to travel to historic Plymouth, Massachusetts to see first-hand what they had been learning about in the classroom with their teachers.

The third graders started their trip with a tour of the Mayflower II in Plymouth Harbor. Students were able to step aboard this full-scale replica of the ship that brought the Pilgrims to Plymouth in 1620. On board, they learned about how the ship sailed, where the passengers lived, and the hardships they faced on their journey across the Atlantic. Then, the students made their way to Patuxet, which was the indigenous name of the place where the Mayflower passengers settled, which in the Wampanoag language means, "place of running water."





Next, the students were able to visit a historic Patuxet Homesite and discover the history and culture of the Wampanoag people who had lived on this land long before the Pilgrims arrived. As a living museum, this is the one area of the field trip that has changed the most from my own experience as a 3rd grader who visited what was then called Plimoth Plantation in the 1980's. Far more attention is now given to the indigenous people and the museum remains committed to telling this history from multiple perspectives. While there, students were able to step inside a wetu, learn how to make a mishoon (boat), and see how they cooked over a fire.





Then, students visited an English Village that allowed them to step back in time to experience Plymouth Colony in the 1620's. In addition to experts and historians who shared their knowledge, there were also historical performers who portrayed the residents of the colony and interacted with the students. Oftentimes, students were encouraged to help out with a task, or to join in a game with the settlers of the colony. The 3rd Graders walked amongst the buildings, through the gardens, and were able to see firsthand what it would have been like to be alive at that time.







In closing, I feel fortunate that while others all over the country are learning about Thanksgiving, we were able to visit such an important historical place with just a short bus ride. One of the slogans at Plimoth Patuxet is, "You Can't Change History, But It Could Change You." Through the incredible instruction of our social studies teachers, combined with real life experiences such as this field trip to Plimoth Patuxet, one can feel grateful that

these students will grow up and work to improve the world as they themselves make history.

I also want to thank AuJané, Darlene, Danette and Amy for sharing their amazing pictures. I hope everyone has a wonderful Thanksgiving and wish you and your family all the best.



#### **LOST & FOUND**

**LABEL** everything that comes to school. We check all clothing for names before donating and 95% of the time there is no name.

**UNDERSTAND** the program is run by volunteers and dates are subject to change.

#### From the Health Office

Students entering K, 4th, 7th and 12th grade are required to submit a current physical form that is less than 13 months old. All students planning on participating in sports must have a current physical submitted to the health office and uploaded to the SchoolID website when registering the student to participate in sports. Students who do not have a current physical form on file will not be allowed to try out or participate in any sports programs.

If your student is sick we ask that you keep them home from school. Absences with a doctor's note will be excused absences. Your student is required to stay home in the following situations:

- Fever. Students may return to school once fever has resolved for 24 hours without any medications.
- Vomiting or diarrhea. Students may return to school once vomiting or diarrhea has resolved for 24 hours.
- Contagious illnesses (such as strep or conjunctivitis). Students may return after starting antibiotics for 24 hours and remain fever free for 24 hours.
- Positive for COVID-19. Please contact your school nurse to determine when your student can

Students who develop any of these symptoms during the school day will need to be picked up promptly.
