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# A Message from Angie

The South Shore Charter School buzzes with activity long after the last bus pulls off of Longwater Drive at the close of the school day and the dismissal line disappears into the driveway. Athletics, music, enrichment, and academic support programs provide our students with opportunities to engage with peers and develop skills outside of school hours. These programs are expanding in response to student needs and family feedback.

Last week saw the end of the 2023 fall athletic season. Our athletic program has grown tremendously over the past few years both in terms of the number of students participating and the level of competition. Thanks to the hard work of our coaches and our athletic directors, JP Marcellus and Joe Kay, we celebrated the first MIAA tournament bids in SSCPS history.

Our extracurricular music opportunities have expanded to the point where we must take advantage of the time available both before school and after school. Students in grades 3-12 sing and play in extracurricular chorus, beginning strings, concert band, orchestra, and jazz band. For some this supplements music focused Projects and Workshops. For other students, after school opportunities allow for the exploration of different interests during Project and Workshop. We are looking forward to listening to our student musicians at our performance group Winter Concert on Wednesday, December 5th.





Monday saw the launch of the first session of our pilot after school enrichment program. We have 85 Level II and Level III students engaged in a variety of activities including organized sports, visual arts, STEAM, yoga, theater, and coding after school twice a week. The goal of the program is to provide students with opportunities to collaborate with a variety of peers in a relaxed, social atmosphere that allows them to explore their interests and develop new ones. All of the enrichment activities are run by SSCPS teachers. Many of the clubs include high school student assistants who are in the classrooms supporting students. The first session of the program will end before we leave for the holiday break with a new session set to start late in January. We hope to grow the program over the course of the year.


The enrichment program is running in parallel with both our English Language Learner after school tutoring program that began yesterday and our Title I tutoring program that begins after the Thanksgiving holiday. Tutoring programs allow teachers to provide small group targeted instruction to fill gaps and strengthen foundational skills. The tutoring programs intentionally run on different days than enrichment clubs so that students do not have to choose between extracurricular activities and academics. Both are important to the school experience.

The pilot enrichment program is the direct result of productive conversations that the School Council had over the course of the 2022-2023 school year. The parents, teachers, and students that served on our School Council identified a need for community building activities outside of the school day. The group also recognized the challenges that the COVID-19 pandemic posed for the service element of our mission and developed benchmarks to support a goal to strengthen community service across our campus. The goal for community engagement that created the enrichment pilot and the community service goal are both outlined in the School Improvement Plan written by the School Council. It was wonderful to see so many parents and last week's School Council meeting. I look forward to another year of conversations that help set meaningful goals.

The enrichment program is possible because of the hard work of Nadeen Sullivan, our Enrichment and Community Service Coordinator. Nadeen started in this newly created role at the start of the school year. Since then she has put systems in place to create programming that both taps into the expertise of our faculty and is tailored to the interests of our students. Any new program is a significant undertaking and requires a thoughtful approach. A new program at a regional school that impacts dismissal and brings students together across two buildings is a logistical behemoth. Nadeen has shown that she is able to tame the beast.






# **Level I Projects**

Carrot Day has been a tradition at SSCPS for many years. Like so many things, the pandemic altered the usual planting and harvesting seasons as we had known them.

This past spring, carrots were planted by first grade co-teachers Nikiesha Whitman and June Fontaine's first grade students in the Garden Project. The first crop didn't fare too well, due to all the rain, so a second crop was planted in early summer, along with tomatoes, cucumbers, eggplant and peppers. Students delighted in harvesting these crops when they came back to school in late August. They knew the rule of the carrots though; they were not to be harvested until after the first frost, as the cold converts the starches to sugar, making them sweet and delicious. Last week we got that first frost and so on Friday, the second grade students in Nikiesha's pod who had planted the carrots, helped the first grade "neighbors" to pull these orange jewels. Watching the students work together was truly gratifying. After scrubbing them on Monday, the students enjoyed the carrots during snack time today. A good 95% of the class ate them! And several had more at lunch time.









Here's hoping that the delicious sweetness of these "frost-kissed" carrots will give them a taste and desire to enjoy this nutritious vegetable in the future. Next year, we plan to plant many more carrot seeds so that a larger community can enjoy Carrot Day together.



#### **LOST & FOUND**

**UNDERSTAND** the program is run by volunteers and dates are subject to change.

#### From the Health Office

Students entering K, 4th, 7th and 12th grade are required to submit a current physical form that is less than 13 months old. All students planning on participating in sports must have a current physical submitted to the health office and uploaded to the SchoolID website when registering the student to participate in sports. Students who do not have a current physical form on file will not be allowed to try out or participate in any sports programs.

If your student is sick we ask that you keep them home from school. Absences with a doctor's note will be excused absences. Your student is required to stay home in the following situations:

- Fever. Students may return to school once fever has resolved for 24 hours without any medications.
- Vomiting or diarrhea. Students may return to school once vomiting or diarrhea has resolved for 24 hours.
- Contagious illnesses (such as strep or conjunctivitis). Students may return after starting antibiotics for 24 hours and remain fever free for 24 hours.
- Positive for COVID-19. Please contact your school nurse to determine when your student can

Students who develop any of these symptoms during the school day will need to be picked up promptly.
