A Message from Michelle

Dear Parents,

You've probably heard this question countless times: "What do you want to be when you grow up?" It's a question we ask our kids from a young age, and it continues all the way through high school. It's heartwarming to see their imaginative answers when they're little because they're still discovering the world. Their choices are influenced by their knowledge and exposure to the world.

As our children grow, the question takes on a more practical tone in high school. They become young adults with interests that are maturing and often are forced to begin narrowing down their options. They start to think about things like, "What will I study in college?" or "What if college isn't for me?" These are important questions they have to face.

Our students with disabilities have a unique path. Transition Planning begins at age 14 and is part of their IEPs to help them prepare for the future. For those with mild disabilities, their path is often similar to other students. But those with more complex challenges need extra support, and so do their parents as they explore post-high school options.

This is where "self-determination" comes in as a big deal. Studies have shown that students who can make decisions for themselves are more likely to find jobs and earn more money, even if they have learning or cognitive disabilities (Field & Hoffman, 2002, Journal of Disability Policy Studies, 13, 113-118). Self-determination is a skill students must start learning early. It's as simple as letting them make choices and encouraging them to do so. We sometimes focus too much on telling them what to do. Focusing on teaching compliance sometimes leaves little room for empowerment in their formative years.

A self-determined person is someone who knows what they want. Knowing what you want leads to the ability to self-advocate, ask for help, and not be afraid to express your wants

and needs. Also tied into these concepts is disability awareness; a person must understand their own limitations and how to overcome obstacles. They must learn to find unique ways to go around the barriers that impede their journey.

These skills are something our students can learn. At the high school level, we have developed a class that teaches exactly these skills. Students are learning by doing. Recently, we took this class out into the community to make a purchase for a snack, and for some students, this task was hard. They were allowed to choose anything they wanted, and some of our students really struggled with that freedom.

Planning for life after high school for students with disabilities needs to start early. They need to figure out who they are, what they're good at, how their disability affects them, what they like, and what they want for the future. It's a journey that takes time, guidance, and a big effort from both students and parents.

As we think about our roles as parents and educators, let's consider the importance of helping our children become more independent. It's a gift that will give them confidence and strength as they become adults. By letting them make choices, stand up for themselves, and overcome challenges, we're giving them the skills they need to reach their goals.

HIGH SCHOOL CROSS COUNTRY



Wishing the middle school cross country team well as they compete this weekend for the championship!





FROM THE HEALTH OFFICE

If your student takes prescription medication during the school day, including epipens or inhalers, the medication will need to be dropped off to the school nurse by an adult. Medication cannot be sent on the bus with students. All medication needs to be accompanied by a prescription medication form. Your doctor may fill out their own medication form, an Asthma Action Plan, Allergy Action Plan, or the school's **Prescription Drug Form**. No medication can be accepted without the proper paperwork. Parents/guardians will also need to sign the form to give permission for medication to be administered in school. Students can not bring in over the counter medication. All medication needed at school must be held in the Health Office and have the proper paperwork in order for it to be administered at school.

If your student is planning on playing a school sport in the fall they must have a current physical dated within the past 13 months. Students who do not have a current physical will not be allowed to try out or participate in sports. You may submit health forms to:

Students entering K, 4th, 7th & 10th grade must submit current physical forms and vaccine records.

The K through 8 school is a **peanut/nut free** building. Please make sure you do not send your child to school with any food that contains peanuts or nuts or the label reads "may contain nuts or traces of nuts". Caffeinated beverages are not allowed in the elementary school. Please send your student to school with a reusable water bottle as the school does not provide water bottles. Level 1 students should have a full change of weather appropriate clothes that is kept at school.

Please reach out to your school nurse and teacher if your student is sick. Students who have vomiting, diarrhea, or a fever of 100 or above need to remain out of school until the symptoms or fever have resolved for 24 hours. If your student has strep throat, conjunctivitis or any other contagious illness they will need to remain out until they have been on antibiotics for 24 hours. Students who develop any of these symptoms during the school day will need to be picked up from school promptly. Please make sure your contact information with the school is up to date. Absences can be reported to attendance@sscps.org.

If your student tests positive for COVID-19 please reach out to your school nurse so it can be determined when your student is able to return to school. Thank you!


