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### A Message from Angie

Last week saw the end of the first quarter for students in grades 5-12. Student report cards will be emailed home later this week. The trimester for students in grades 1-4 will close in two short weeks and Parent-Teacher Conferences to discuss student progress will take place in December for all grades. Details about the conferences and how to schedule appointments will be shared around Thanksgiving. These reports and meetings provide families with important feedback on the important work taking place in classrooms across our campus.

While our teachers and students are working hard across grades and subjects, early literacy initiatives have been especially important in our work to improve outcomes for all students in recent months. We have been lucky to receive grant funding that has facilitated a deep examination of our curriculum, systems of assessment, strategies for intervention, and instructional practices. Teachers and the leadership team have used this information to make changes that allow us to meet the needs of all our students. This work has been especially busy in the area of K-2 foundational literacy skills.

Our school is in the second year of implementation of a literacy action plan written through our participation in the Lead for Literacy grant during the 2022-2023 school year. The action plan places a comprehensive, evidence-based curriculum for all students that prioritizes systematic phonics instruction at its core. The steps outlined in the plan ensure that all Kindergarten through second grade students at South Shore Charter Public School engage in explicit reading instruction that includes phonological awareness, phonics, print concepts, spelling, and writing. Students apply the skills they learn to reading a variety of texts that move methodically from simple to complex. Oral language surrounds and supports all literacy instruction and the approach is multisensory, culturally responsive, and differentiated.

Executing an early literacy curriculum that meets these requirements is a weighty task that requires a great deal of careful planning and specialized expertise. Students on Level I have a teaching team that puts in that time, isn't afraid of hard work, and brings incredible skill to the implementation of this critical foundational curriculum. We have had the opportunity to enhance their expertise and support their planning with targeted professional development across different aspects of literacy instruction.

Central to the implementation of the literacy plan is the adoption of a new tier 1 reading curriculum, <u>Wonders 2023</u>, for grades K-4. Teachers are continuing the work of implementation which began prior to the close of the 2022-2023 school year with two full days of professional development to prepare teachers for the shift. We followed this work with two additional professional development days over the course of last school year. In year two teachers are refining the curriculum and working to integrate the additional phonics and phonemic awareness elements that are central to effective literacy instruction.

This year our K-2 teachers are participating in the <u>Appleseeds Materials and</u> <u>Professional Development Grant</u> to support strong phonics instruction for all early childhood students. The Appleseeds curriculum is a revised edition of the Core Knowledge Language Arts Skills curriculum that our teachers have used for over a decade. Participation in the grant has provided us with new versions of the materials, professional development for teachers tailored to needs determined through classroom visits and data analysis, and extensive professional development for school leaders to support implementation.

Literacy instruction on Level I is highly informed by data. Students participate in <u>DIBELS 8</u> assessments three times a year and struggling students are followed more closely through progressing monitoring that is embedded in the system. This data allows teachers to create groups and targeted lessons to meet the needs of students. Much of this specialized instruction occurs during FIT time and in literacy centers that are incorporated into the literacy block. Last spring SSCPS received grant funding to support professional development to guide teacher learning focused on the tools embedded in the assessment system. This professional learning has helped teachers plan to support students through targeted small group instruction.

We paired the new curriculum with scheduling changes that extended the literacy block for all students in grades K-4. Over the course of last school year, teachers worked collaboratively by grade level with the support of Kristen Gale, our literacy coordinator, to design a literacy block with the appropriate balance of phonemic awareness through **Heggerty**, direct phonics instruction, and reading comprehension. This balance shifted throughout the year in response to data. This year teachers were able to hit the ground running with planning informed by their first run through the curriculum.

Literacy instruction at SSCPS is designed to support all students, including our English Language Learners and students with disabilities. Designing supports is integral to the lesson planning process. This year a team of K-4 teachers will be attending the Massachusetts Dyslexia Institute with grant funding. The institute will offer our team the opportunity to develop a Dyslexia Action Plan. The plan will identify general and special education structures and supports to meet the needs of students at risk of poor reading outcomes, including students at risk of dyslexia.

Through a strong, data-informed literacy program, our teachers are creating a foundation for reading success in the early grades that sets the stage for high academic achievement as students continue in their academic careers. ## From the SSCPS Board of Trustees

Dear School Community/Parents and Guardians/Stakeholders,

I am reaching out on behalf of the Board of Trustees to share important updates and considerations regarding a potential expansion of enrollment at SSCPS. This proposal would allow us to welcome an additional 225 students to our school community, allowing us to provide high-quality, accessible education to a diverse group of learners. We believe it is important to approach this decision with transparency and to keep you, our valued community members, informed of both the potential benefits and challenges.

#### Potential Benefits of Enrollment Expansion

- 1. Space Needs: There is an increasing need for more space for both students and teachers, which could be alleviated by expansion.
- Increased Diversity and Enhanced Learning Environment: Expanding enrollment offers the opportunity to welcome new students from varied backgrounds, bringing fresh perspectives that enrich our school culture and support a more dynamic, inclusive learning experience for all.
- 3. Broader Range of Programs and Services: A larger student body can support the growth of specialized programs, extracurricular activities, and resources that might otherwise be limited. We anticipate that with expanded enrollment, we can offer more robust options in arts, athletics, advanced academics, and other areas that contribute to well-rounded student development.
- 4. Enhanced Facilities and Resources: The expansion may allow us to invest in upgraded facilities, technology that benefit every student. With more students, we can apply for larger grants and explore new funding sources, making it possible to further develop our campus and resources.
- 5. Greater Community Engagement and Partnerships: Welcoming new families fosters stronger ties with local organizations, businesses, and stakeholders, creating partnerships that support the school and surrounding community. An expanded network offers mutual benefit.

#### **Considerations and Potential Challenges**

- Impact on Class Sizes and Individual Attention: While we aim to maintain our commitment to small class sizes, an increase in enrollment may require adjustments in classroom structure. To preserve the quality of education, we are considering ways to manage these changes, such as hiring additional qualified teachers and support staff.
- 2. Resource Allocation and Budgetary Considerations: Expanding enrollment means we will need to assess and potentially upgrade our physical space, from classrooms

to common areas, to accommodate a larger student body comfortably. This will require a significant financial commitment.

- 3. School Culture and Community Balance: A significant increase in enrollment can bring changes to our close-knit community feel. Families value the strong relationships between students, staff, and families.
- Strategic Decision: Even if expansion is financially feasible, the board must consider whether acquiring the entirety of 700 Longwater is the right strategic decision for SSCPS.

#### Your Input is Vital

This potential enrollment expansion represents an exciting growth opportunity for SSCPS, but it also requires thoughtful consideration of financial viability, stakeholder impact, and the strategic alignment with the school's long-term goals. We are committed to making decisions that best serve our current and future students, staff, and families. To that end, we value your insights and feedback. In the coming weeks, we will hold open forums and send out surveys to gather your thoughts on this proposal.

Thank you for your continued support, and for being an essential part of SSCPS. We look forward to working together to shape the future of our school and ensure it remains a place where every student can thrive. In the meantime, stakeholders can find a truncated <u>memorandum</u> outlining the considerations of the BOT in the link.







# Level II - Grade 3 Mock Election





Halloween was a blast as we explored the magic of dry ice! This solid form of CO2



# **STEAM Dream Team**



# Volunteering at SSCPS

Anyone who is working with children or within our SSCPS buildings must be officially registered as a volunteer. This policy is in place to protect our students. Volunteers must register each school year. In order to register as a volunteer, you must complete all of the requirements listed below.

- 1. Complete a CORI form. This requirement must be met annually. The CORI form should be returned to the school to the attention of Pam Algera with a copy of a photo id.
- Complete Identogo Fingerprinting. This task must be completed every three years. Fingerprinting is completed off site and has a cost. SSCPS will reimburse parent/guardian volunteers for this cost.
- 3. Complete Volunteer Training and agree to the Confidentiality Policy. Take the Volunteer Training Quiz. This requirement must be met annually. The training is available on <u>volunteering page on our website</u>.

## **Health Office**

If your student takes prescription medication during the school day, including epipens or inhalers, the medication will need to be dropped off to the school nurse by an adult. Medication cannot be sent on the bus with students. All medication needs to be accompanied by a new prescription medication form each year. Your doctor may fill out their own medication form, an Asthma Action Plan, Allergy Action Plan, or the school's **Prescription Drug Form**. No medication can be accepted without the proper paperwork.

Parents/guardians will also need to sign the form to give permission for medication to be administered in school. Students can not bring in over the counter medication. All medication needed at school must be held in the Health Office and have the proper paperwork in order for it to be administered at school. Please check expiration dates of medication before sending it in. Medication that expires during the school year will need to be replaced before it expires. Please reach out to your school nurse if you have any guestions about medications.

Students entering K, 4th, 7th & 10th grade must submit current physical forms and vaccine records.

The K through 8 school is a **peanut/nut free** building. Please make sure you do not send your child to school with any food that contains peanuts or nuts or the label reads "may contain nuts or traces of nuts". Caffeinated beverages are not allowed in the elementary school. Please send your student to school with a reusable water bottle as the school does not provide water bottles.

Please reach out to your school nurse and teacher if your student is sick. Students who have vomiting, diarrhea, or a fever of 100 or above need to remain out of school until the symptoms or fever have resolved for 24 hours. If your student has strep throat, conjunctivitis or any other contagious illness they will need to remain out until they have been on antibiotics for 24 hours. Students who develop any of these symptoms during the school day will need to be picked up from school promptly. Please make sure your contact information with the school is up to date. Absences can be reported to attendance@sscps.org.

Level I students should have a full change of weather appropriate clothes that is kept at school.
