This is a quote that I have had in my office for many years because as a guidance counselor, many students seek the answer to that daunting question: "What should I do after school?" or "What should I major in?". In my role as a guidance counselor, it is my job not to tell anyone what to do (especially a high school student), but rather guide them

through the process of finding the answer to this question for themselves.

To help students with this process, guidance helps support students through various activities and events, including Parent Nights, as well as individual and group meetings. I primarily work with the juniors and seniors as their Guidance Counselor, and Ahminchie Estime is our new freshman and sophomore counselor this year.

Below is a summary of guidance services by grade level:

**Senior Year:** This year, seniors started the year off with a mini college fair in early September as well as having a Senior Seminar for the first quarter. Senior Seminar is a space for students to work on college applications, go over the college search process and participate in mini lessons on resume writing, financial aid, careers, and internships.

**Junior Year:** The juniors took the PSAT last Friday and will take the SAT Day Exam on April 11, 2025. The first half of junior year is working on keeping up grades, extra curricular activities, and bringing their resume as well as looking at different career paths. Junior Seminar FIT will be in the Quarter 3 and we end the year by attending a college fair at Bridgewater State University.

**Sophomore Year:** During the sophomore year, guidance supports students in their academics with a focus on test taking and career exploration. As sophomores, students will take MCAS and a practice PSAT10 in the Spring.

- Work with students on career development
- Encourage students to keep up with community service
- Counsel students on Advanced Placement courses for Junior year
- Utilize Naviance for exploring college majors and careers

**Freshman Year:** The goal of freshman year guidance is to help students transition into high school.

- Freshman Orientation
- Assist students with time management, study skills, and report card review
- · Help students understand the importance of a strong freshman year
- All freshman will create a CollegeBoard and Naviance account, PSAT 8/9

## Level III Pumpkin Carving



Fourth grade students in Jenn's Pod read books about kindness to second graders in Tracey's Pod. They will be working together throughout the year on community service projects!











## **Students vs. Teachers Basketball Game**




## Afterschool Enrichment Program 2024-2025

## **Chemical Creations Club**

### Week 2: The Fascinating World of Polymers

This week, students delved into the science of polymers, with a spotlight on sodium polyacrylate – a super-absorbent polymer that can hold up to 300 times its weight in water, famously used in diapers. Using 3D molecular kits, they explored how polymers form by linking individual molecules. The hands-on experiments that followed allowed students to witness the incredible water-absorbing properties of sodium polyacrylate. They had fun manipulating the polymer and adding vibrant dyes, making for an engaging and colorful learning experience!

We're excited to share that we've completed our first project! Last Thursday, we kicked things off by using pencils to create unique Name Art designs, followed by outlining them in sharpie for a bold finish. 


## **Coding & Technology Club**


We've had an exciting start in the Coding and Technology Enrichment class! The students are a talented, eager group showing great enthusiasm for learning to code. I'll be sharing updates every two weeks to keep you in the loop. Here's a summary of what we've accomplished so far:

#### Week 1:

Students were introduced to Snap! Programming, a visual, block-based language that allows users to create interactive animations, games, and stories. They created their accounts and completed their first project—a fun game where they tried to click on Alonzo, the program's mascot, as he jumped across the screen.

Students programmed a game in which the goal is to click on Alonzo as he's moving around.

#### Week 2:

Building on the first project, students enhanced their "Click Alonzo" game by making the character fade gradually with each click, eventually disappearing when the player wins. We also explored looping concepts using commands like "forever," "repeat," and "for" loops. Students applied these loops to generate creative polygon art, showcasing their growing coding skills. It's been amazing to see their creativity and enthusiasm! Stay tuned for more updates as they continue to explore the exciting world of coding!

## **SSCPS Parent Directory Update**

### **Health Office**

If your student takes prescription medication during the school day, including epipens or inhalers, the medication will need to be dropped off to the school nurse by an adult. Medication cannot be sent on the bus with students. All medication needs to be accompanied by a new prescription medication form each year. Your doctor may fill out their own medication form, an Asthma Action Plan, Allergy Action Plan, or the school's **Prescription Drug Form**. No medication can be accepted without the proper paperwork. Parents/guardians will also need to sign the form to give permission for medication. All medication needed at school must be held in the Health Office and have the proper paperwork in order for it to be administered at school. Please check expiration dates of medication before sending it in. Medication that expires during the school year will need to be replaced before it expires. Please reach out to your school nurse if you have any questions about medications.

If your student is planning on playing a school sport in the fall they must have a current physical dated within the past 13 months of the start of the sports season. Students entering K, 4th, 7th & 10th grade must submit current physical forms and vaccine records.

The K through 8 school is a **peanut/nut free** building. Please make sure you do not send your child to school with any food that contains peanuts or nuts or the label reads "may contain nuts or traces of nuts". Caffeinated beverages are not allowed in the elementary school. Please send your student to school with a reusable water bottle as the school does not provide water bottles.

Please reach out to your school nurse and teacher if your student is sick. Students who have vomiting, diarrhea, or a fever of 100 or above need to remain out of school until the symptoms or fever have resolved for 24 hours. If your student has strep throat, conjunctivitis or any other contagious illness they will need to remain out until they have been on antibiotics for 24 hours. Students who develop any of these symptoms during the school day will need to be picked up from school promptly. Please make sure your contact information with the school is up to date. Absences can be reported to attendance@sscps.org.

Level I students should have a full change of weather appropriate clothes that is kept at school.
