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A Message from Angie

I hope your family enjoyed a restful and joyful holiday break. As we return to school and begin a new calendar year, our classrooms are full of fresh energy and focus. Students and teachers are settling back into routines, diving into new learning, and reflecting on how far they've come since those first school days in August. This is a busy season for teaching and learning as we approach the midpoint of the school year and the close of the second quarter ends for 5-12 students on Tuesday, January 20th.

For our students in grades 7-12, this is also midyear exam season. These exams are designed by teachers to test student progress in our curriculum and the results of these exams supply important data about student achievement. Students will complete exams in English, history, science, math, and world language. Students on Level IV will take their iReady Benchmark assessment in place of a traditional math exam. This allows us to use the extended testing time to gather important data as we track student progress toward mastering grade-level skills.

While the midyears are an important measure of student achievement, they are also critical in helping students develop the study skills that they need in order to successfully complete exams at the post-secondary level. Students will go into the extended Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. weekend armed with study guides to help them prepare for their exams. Some students may need parental encouragement to take advantage of the study opportunity that the extended weekend provides.

Scores on midyear exams account for 10% of a student's final grade, a significant percentage. Knowledge of that significance is motivating for many students and spurs a healthy level of stress that drives achievement. We understand that for some students exams can cause excessive stress and anxiety. This is especially the case for our seventh grade students who are preparing for this type of exam for the first time and do not know what to expect. Taking the time necessary to prepare can help with the stress. If you are concerned about the level of stress your child is exhibiting, please reach out to their advisor or pod teacher so that we can provide support at school.

The schedule for midyear exams is below. All students in grades 7-12 will be dismissed at 12:00 pm on Wednesday, January 21st, Thursday, January 22nd, and Friday, January 23rd. Please prepare for pickup accordingly as we do not have bus transportation available. On Friday, January 23rd, high school students will be dismissed by 10:00 if

they are not taking a make-up exam. Taking exams is exhausting for students. The early dismissal provides students with a well-deserved break. As a reminder, all students in grades K-6 must be met by an adult at the bus stop in the afternoon. If your K-6 child usually walks home with your older student, please plan for alternative arrangements on the midyear exam dates.


Important Drop Off & Pick Up Reminders

Protocol for absences, tardiness and dismissing students early:

When your child is absent and leaving a message, please be sure to leave the **first and last name as well as the grade of your child**. Any changes can be sent to attendance@sscps.org.

Drop off in the morning by 8:10am.

Please try to arrive by or before 8:10am so that teachers can take attendance and students can prepare for classes that start at 8:20am. **At 8:15am the doors will close and students will be marked as tardy.**

100 Longwater Drive (Grades K-6): Dismissal will begin for buses (1-8)

700 Longwater Drive (Grades 7-12): Dismissal will begin for buses (9-17)

After the buses are loaded, buses 1-8 will depart for 700, and buses 9-17 will depart for 100 to pick up the remaining students.

Carline dismissal will begin for 100 after the first round of buses (1-8) depart.

Carline dismissal will begin at 700 after the second round of buses depart.

Procedure for 700 Longwater Drive (Grades 7-12) Dismissal

(See Map)


There will be 3 carlines at 700 Longwater:

- The far right (green arrow) will be for Grades 7-8
- The double green arrow is for Grades 9-12

After the buses have completed pickup, cars for grades 7-8 will pick up around the traffic circle to the right of the building and exit, following the blue arrows.

After the buses have completed pick up, cars for grades 9-12 will pick up in front of the building, along the sidewalk.

If you are picking up students in both grades 7-8 and 9-12, pick up your 7-8th grade student first, then continue to the grade 9-12 pickup.

From the Dean's Desk

A New Year, Moving Forward Together

We ask for your patience, your openness, and your collaboration as we move forward. The conversations we have together — even the difficult ones — matter.

We ask for your patience, your openness, and your collaboration as we move forward. The conversations we have together — even the difficult ones — matter. They help us stay focused on what is best for students and ensure that expectations at school and at home are working in the same direction.

This new year is not about perfection. It is about progress. It is about recommitting to the work of helping children become thoughtful learners, responsible community members, and people who know how to navigate challenges with care and resilience.

Thank you for your trust, your support, and your willingness to walk this path with us. When families and school move forward together, our students are the ones who benefit most.



Important Reminders | 2025-2026

Please be advised that per our school policy, if your student has a fever, vomiting, diarrhea, or a contagious illness, they must remain out of school until symptoms have resolved for 24 hours without medication or they have been on antibiotics for a full 24 hours. If your student will be absent from school, please email attendance@sscps.org as well as your student's teacher.

This is also a reminder that over-the-counter medications (including, but not limited to, eye drops, allergy medications, cough medications, vitamins, and nasal sprays) may not be brought into school by students. All medication within the school system is considered prescription and requires a doctor's prescription medication form. Before any medication is brought to school, it must be discussed with the school nurse and must be accompanied by the required prescription medication form. If a student is found to have any medication on them, it will be brought to the health office and a parent will need to pick it up or it will be disposed of.

Please also be advised that we will be beginning state-required vision, hearing, height, and weight screenings, based on your student's grade. If you would like to opt your student out of part or all of these screenings, please email your student's school nurse.

Please make sure all students are dressed appropriately for the weather. Students go outside for recess daily, except in inclement weather or when the wind chill temperature drops below 20 degrees. Students in grades K through 2nd should have a spare set of weather appropriate clothing in their backpacks/classrooms.
