This week, we entered the second half of June and the final stretch of the 2025–2026 school year. After months of students and teachers hard at work focused on teaching and learning, we are celebrating the culmination of a terrific year with field days, award ceremonies, clap-outs, and engaging end-of-year projects. Across our campus, we are recognizing student achievement through our concerts, the art show, Exhibitions of Mastery, and, of course, graduation.

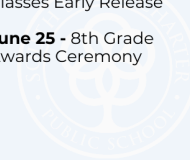

SUN Bucks 2026

SUN Bucks, the federal food benefit program once known as Summer EBT, is returning for summer 2026. SUN Bucks provides a \$120 lump-sum summer benefit per school-aged child for income-eligible families. The program is administered by the state Department of Transitional Assistance (DTA) in partnership with DESE and with assistance from schools.

SUN Bucks income eligibility standards are the same as those for the National School Lunch Program (NSLP).

As such, all enrolled students identified as meeting the income eligibility standards for free or reduced-price lunch during school year 2025-26, either through an NSLP household paper application or direct certification, are automatically eligible for SUN Bucks.

Students identified as homeless, migrant, runaway or participating in Head Start are also automatically eligible. Students who do not meet the aforementioned criteria can apply for SUN Bucks benefits through DTA by visiting www.DTAConnect.com.

From the Dean's Desk

This week, our nation observes Juneteenth.

For many Americans, Juneteenth is a historical event that happened long ago. For me, it has always felt much closer than that.

My family comes from Texas. My great-grandfather, Thornton Carter, was born into slavery. My grandfather, Elijah Carter, and later my mother, came of age in the long shadow of the Jim Crow South. The distance between those chapters of American history and my own life is not nearly as great as many people imagine.

Growing up, I heard stories that made history feel personal. These were not stories about famous people in textbooks. They were stories about family members. People whose names I knew. People whose choices, sacrifices, and perseverance shaped the opportunities that I enjoy today.

When I think about Juneteenth, I do not think first about a date on a calendar. I think about Thornton Carter. I think about Elijah Carter. I think about my mother. I think about generations of people who kept moving forward despite circumstances that would have caused many others to lose hope.

Bit by bit, and against extraordinary odds, they built lives for themselves and their families. Their children stood on their shoulders. Then their grandchildren stood on theirs. Each generation inherited opportunities that the previous generation fought to create.

I stand on those shoulders every day.

The more I think about it, the more I realize that all of our students do as well.

One of the great gifts of our school community is its diversity. Our students come from families with roots in Ireland, Haiti, Cape Verde, Italy, China, Japan, Czech Republic, Nigeria, Puerto Rico, the Dominican Republic, Brazil, and countless other places around the world. Some families arrived generations ago. Others more recently. Some came seeking opportunity. Some came seeking safety. Some came seeking both.

The details of those journeys are different, but they share something important. Somewhere in each family's story are people who sacrificed, persevered, and worked to create opportunities for those who would come after them.

Our students are the beneficiaries of those efforts.

They are also the next chapter.

As another school year comes to a close, I find myself thinking about the responsibility that comes with that inheritance. We honor those who came before us not only by remembering their stories, but by building something worthy of their sacrifices.

Juneteenth reminds us that progress is possible. It reminds us that freedom and opportunity are precious. And it reminds us that every generation has a responsibility to leave something better behind for the next.

Our students are already beginning that work.

Summer Explorers Program (Youth Ages 12-16)

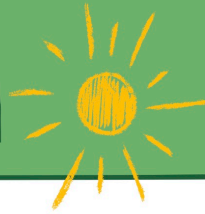

For Senior Families - Financial Aid Information

As you consider your options after high school, we encourage you to fill out the [Free Application for Federal Student Aid](#), known as the FAFSA, in order to access grants, federal student loans, and work-study funds for college. Filling out the FAFSA is one of the most important steps students and their families can take to pay for college and is the key to unlocking college financial aid from federal, state, and local sources.

If your immigration status prevents you from qualifying for federal aid, you might still be eligible for aid through the [Massachusetts Application for State Financial Aid \(MASFA\)](#), which can help you attend public institutions of higher education in Massachusetts.

Applying for financial aid helps keep college an option for the fall but does not commit you to enrolling. Fill out the FAFSA or MASFA as early as possible to maximize the aid you can receive.

There are resources available to help with this process, including the following:

[Go Higher](#) is the Commonwealth's initiative to share information about access and affordability at public institutions of higher education in Massachusetts. Go Higher offers paths that make higher education more affordable—like free community college, free or affordable four-year degrees, career-connected scholarships, and more.

DESE, in collaboration with the Department of Higher Education and the Executive Office of Education, has identified [FAFSA resources that may be helpful](#).

The Department of Higher Education's [Office of Student Financial Assistance](#) is the Commonwealth's "go to" on resources concerning student financial aid.

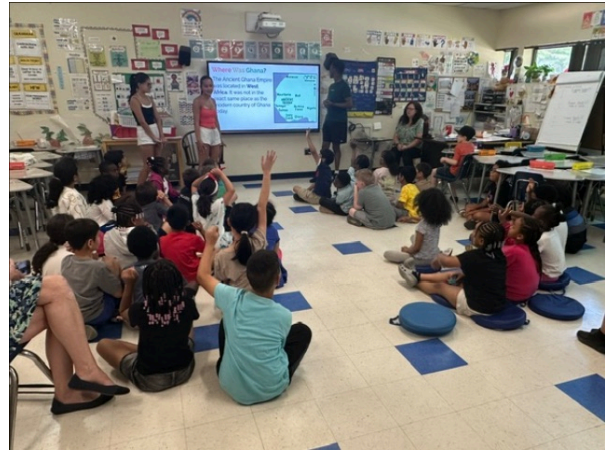

Medication Pick Up Schedule & Reminders

Medication Pick Up Schedule

Kindergarten Students

- Medication pickup begins **June 10** and will be available during drop-off and dismissal times.
- All medications must be picked up by **June 12**.

Grades 1–6

- Medication pickup will be available during drop-off and dismissal times from **June 22 through June 25**.

Grades 7–11

- Please contact **Barbara Folan, RN**, to make arrangements for the return of your student's medication.

Please note that medications cannot remain at school over the summer. All medications must be picked up by **12:30 p.m. on June 25**. Any medications not picked up by that time will be properly disposed of according to school policy.

If you are unable to pick up your child's medication during the designated times, please email us with your child's name so that we can arrange an alternate pickup time.

If your child will be attending a summer program and requires medication, please contact us to make the necessary arrangements.

Medication Requirements for the 2026–2027 School Year

To bring medication to school for the Fall 2026 school year:

- A parent or guardian must deliver the medication to the school.
- Medication must be accompanied by the appropriate documentation, which may include:
 - A physician's prescription medication order
 - An Allergy Action Plan (if applicable)
 - An Asthma Action Plan (if applicable)
- A new medication order is required each school year and must be dated **after July 1, 2026**.
- Medication must be provided in its original pharmacy-labeled container or packaging.

General Health Reminders

Please be advised that per our school policy, if your student has a fever, vomiting, diarrhea, or a contagious illness, they must remain out of school until symptoms have resolved for 24 hours without medication or they have been on antibiotics for a full 24 hours. If your student will be absent from school, please email [**attendance@sscps.org**](mailto:attendance@sscps.org) as well as your student's teacher.

This is also a reminder that over-the-counter medications (including, but not limited to, eye drops, allergy medications, cough medications, vitamins, and nasal sprays) may not be brought into school by students. All medication within the school system is considered prescription and requires a doctor's prescription medication form. Before any medication is brought to school, it must be discussed with the school nurse and must be accompanied by the required prescription medication form. If a student is found to have

any medication on them, it will be brought to the health office and a parent will need to pick it up or it will be disposed of.

Please also be advised that we will be beginning state-required vision, hearing, height, and weight screenings, based on your student's grade. If you would like to opt your student out of part or all of these screenings, please email your student's school nurse.

Please make sure all students are dressed appropriately for the weather. Students go outside for recess daily, except in inclement weather or when the wind chill temperature drops below 20 degrees. Students in grades K through 2nd should have a spare set of weather appropriate clothing in their backpacks/classrooms.
