Bullying is different from a conflict, quarrel, or just being mean.

CONFLICT



When kids quarrel, they usually blame each other. **Conflict** is a normal part of human relationships

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The formal definition of bullying

Intentional
Repetitive
Power imbalance
Impactful



Concept #2:

Bullying today is a different behavior from a generation or two ago.

Concept #2:

What has changed:

WHO is a bully WHO they target WHAT they actually do

Back when dinosaurs roamed the Earth....

Bullies often weren't popular Victims were usually easy prey

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What's happening today?



Data supports dominance of psych bullying in school.

Following you around; stalking you Spying on you Physically harming you (without... Physically harming you (causing an... People deliberately ignoring you or... Calling you names Encouraging others to laugh at you Laughing at you in a cruel way Deliberately turning their back on... Rolling their eyes repeatedly Someone staring at you repeatedly



*Newest data shows that this is even more pronounced

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Obvious/Physical Bullying

- 3rd-5th grade boys on the playground
 - Caught, disciplined by adults
- Most physical bullying reported in newspapers is actually assault

Gateway behaviors

- Ignoring
- Whispering
- Eye rolling
- Careful not to break any school rules

Does that mean that every eye roll is bullying?

Bullying is obvious to the target, but not to the observer
Target assumes adult knows (cognitive ceiling)
Bullying and teasing look the same!

Is it bullying?

•Adults look for repetition, clues about a power imbalance

Crucial to know the children

•Not really important to determine if it is bullying--what's important is to respond

How teachers are trained
Always respond to overt behaviors
Clues of repetition/power imbalance investigate further

Concept #3:

Gender differences in bullying and cyberbullying.



Boys

Motive = joke/being cool

Girls

Motive is joke or <u>anger</u>

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Online, their behaviors are different too

Boys = Gaming Sites Girls = Social Network Sites (like FaceBook or MySpace)

Characteristics

- High comfort level with technology
- Constant flow of information
- "I MUST stay in touch" -Anxiety
- Tolerance for multitasking
- •"No one but my friends will ever see this, even if it's blatantly public"
- "Security? What's that?
 Here's my password, BTW"

MARC Research: Do you feel anxious/pressured to stay in touch electronically?

No, 49%

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Yes, 51%

MARC Research: Did your parents let you use the internet with NO restrictions/supervision?



Immersion is happening younger and younger

- 50% of 5th grade girls use FaceBook
 - only half with parental knowledge
 - Parents don't know about or disregard age restriction: what message does this send about rules?

35% of 3rd-5th graders own a smart phone; huge increase especially with 3rd graders

Owning a smart phone biggest risk factor for elementary level cyberbullying

How do kids use computers to hurt each other?

 They send cruel messages – either to the victim or to others about the victim – Many different ways to send messages

 Kids post mean things about each other on internet pages

Another Issue: Going online to get revenge after a minor conflict can escalate the conflict into bullying

But when kids get mad and go online, it's easier to belittle and bully – no need to *really talk*

They don't have to see their face

Being online makes anyone feel bolder

Is a PRIVATE profile really PRIVATE?

No.

"Only" their 768 *Friends* have full access

- And can copy and make it public and permanent anytime.

Sexting and coercion

- Doesn't appear to be high risk unless it is coerced
 - Rarely involved strangers
 - Rarely passed on
 - Unsure of long term risk



- Coerced sexting
 - new way to sexually harass
 - Usually girls wanting to get/keep boyfriend
Concept #4:

How is cyber bullying related to in-school bullying?

Cyberbullies are more likely to also be in-school bullies

girl cyberbullies all girls 59% 51% 51% 90% 41% 60% .20% 50% 13% 40% cruel get calling laughing spying others 2 excluding names laugh on you

•This increases with age

Concept #4:

Why we need a "whole school" approach





May affect bystanders even more than targets

What about the bully?

 He may be popular and even the adults may like him

But he's at HIGH RISK of getting into trouble later on in life



Parents are critical

- Most cyberbullying happens at HOME
- But it affects school!
- Use it as a *learning* opportunity – so kids are successful & avoid these behaviors as adults!



What can we do to help?

The good news...

- More kids are reporting, though not always to an adult
- Students are highly aware of this issue

Peers provide the best intervention

- "Just ignore him" reported as extremely effective 68% of the time when a peer says it (38% when an adult says it)
- Adult role in supporting students to help them do this for each other

Most effective school intervention LISTENING!



The "B" word gets everyone's attention: kids know this!



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I'm a victim!



Easier to say that you're being bullied so that adults will take care of it
Child is sometimes avoiding skills work needed to deal with friendships

If everything is serious, then nothing is is serious.

Confidentiality: we can't tell you!

CONFIDENTIAL



Preventing Cyberbullying: It's all about EDUCATION

- 1. "Everything counts"
- 2. "You are NOT invisible"
 - "Private" profiles are NOT PRIVATE
- Generally, people cannot tell that you mean something "as a joke"

- Don't go online / texting when you're mad
- 6. Anything you put online may be there FOREVER

 It may seem funny NOW; but will it seem funny in 2 years? 5 years?

Cyber Safety/Monitoring

- Be conscious of the technology your child is using
- Keyloggers
- Facebook/Email passwords

Be upfront with your child!
